# A SEASON OF DISCERNMENT

Dear GPC Members and Friends,

By the time you read this first issue of The Mainstream for 2024, a lot will already have happened in this brand new year.

- · We will have received the initial report of what our leadership team is learning from the Church Assessment Tool.
- We will have elected a new Nominating Committee.
- · We will have welcomed Katherine Williams as our new Director of Music.
- We will still be wrapping our minds around the reality that later this year Pastor Mary Beth will be launching her new season of life in retirement.

That is a lot for just a few short months!

We will also be well into our congregational commitment to 40 days of prayer, which aligns with our all-church read of Sailboat Church by Joan Gray as we seek God's guidance. (If you haven't picked up the book yet, or joined in on the 40 days of prayer, it's not too late!)

In the last issue of The Mainstream, I outlined our discernment process through May. We are still on track with that plan, with a few more pieces to add to the details between now and the end of May, when we hope to have a Pastoral Nominating Committee (PNC) in place.

The biggest question we have at this point is what our longerterm staffing pattern needs to be in order to fulfill the mission of GPC. Before we can answer that question, we need more clarity on what that mission actually is. Our commitment to this 40 days of prayer is a significant investment in that work, and at the end of that time we will participate in a program that our presbytery offers called a Jump Start Mission Study.

This study takes the work that a PNC would spend months doing and compresses it into an intensive weekend with the purpose of helping to clarify our missional focus for the next season of our congregational life. From there we will be better equipped to determine a sustainable staffing pattern to support that vision, be ready to form a PNC, and begin the process of searching for our next full-time installed pastor who will hopefully be ready to start in early 2025.

Please continue to hold our staff and Session in prayer. I believe that God has called exactly the right people to lead us through this season, and for that I am deeply grateful and filled with hope!

# HAPPY 60TH ANNIVERSARY GPC!

Did you know that on May 17, 2024, GPC will celebrate its Diamond Anniversary? It's a great time to reflect on how far we've come and now, armed with the results of the CAT, make plans for a thriving future.

Looking back, it was in 1962 that the Potomac Presbytery selected Gaithersburg as the location for a new church. On May 17, 1964, Gaithersburg Presbyterian Church was formally organized with 82 charter members. Before our church structure was built, worshipers met at Gaithersburg Junior High and Gaithersburg Senior High. The first church building was constructed in 1966 at our current location. The first service in the new building was held on July 24 of that year. Many of our early members either lived within the limits of the City of Gaithersburg or in nearby neighborhoods.

GPC has gone through quite an evolution during our 60 years. Today, we are more of a regional church, with many members driving 20 miles or more to attend worship. We also have members from approximately 30 different countries.

GPC will celebrate its 60th anniversary throughout the month of May, with Pastor Mary Austin returning to preach on May 12, and Pastor LeAnn Hodges preaching for the formal celebration of our anniversary on May 19 (Pentecost).



# NEWS AND VIEWS FROM MALAWI

GPC benefits from and takes pride in the international diversity of its members. This is the third in a series of articles written by our internationally born members to share some of their home-country cultures and traditions, along with photos of the author and the featured country. We hope that these new, continuing articles in *The Mainstream* will help us build even stronger understanding and connections.

# The Presbyterian Church in Malawi

The Presbyterian church in Malawi holds a prominent position in the

country's religious and social landscape. The church was established by Scottish and Dutch missionaries in the late 19th century and since then the church has grown to become one of the major Christian denominations in Malawi. Known as The Church of Central Africa Presbyterian (CCAP), the church has three presbyteries: the Livingstonia Synod in the northern part, the Nkhoma Synod in the central region, and the Blantyre Synod in the southern region. The doctrine in all three synods is basically the same, the only difference being that both the Livingstonia and Blantyre Synods were established by the Scottish missions in 1924 and the Nkhoma Synod by the Dutch missions in 1926.

Malawi is a religious country. Nearly 87% of its citizens are Christians, so both policymaking and culture are highly influenced by its religious leaders. The Presbyterian church is the second largest denomination after the Catholic church and, as such, is revered; even non-members of the denomination rely on the church to speak up for social injustices as well as contribute to the social development of the country at large. As a result, the Presbyterian church is at the core of every area of socio-political development, including education, health, and governance.

#### **Education**

Education is a cornerstone of the Presbyterian church's mission in Malawi. It has played a pivotal role in establishing schools across the country, contributing significantly to the educational infrastructure. In addition to the mission schools, the church has schools for children with special needs, such as a school for those with visual and hearing impairment. These schools often prioritize not only academic excellence but also the moral and spiritual development of students.

#### **Health**

The church has been actively involved in the well-being of communities, establishing and supporting healthcare facilities. Hospitals and clinics across the country aim to provide accessible medical services to communities. The church further engages in health education and also promotes preventive measures and community health awareness.

#### **Governance**

Historically, the Presbyterian church in Malawi has been engaged in social justice issues and community development. It advocates for ethical governance principles and often participates in initiatives promoting good governance and societal well-being. The leadership of the Presbyterian church frequently has courtesy call meetings with political leaders to advocate for good policies and rebuke them when they feel that political leaders are going astray. When these leaders are not responsive to the advice from the church, the church leadership issues pastoral letters that normally influence voting patterns in the general elections.

#### Women's Guild

The church understands that although the spiritual welfare of its church members ranks high, they have created an enabling environment for its members to fellowship in different ways within the church. The most notable fellowship is the women's guild. Known as Amayi a Mvano or Umanyano (Women in Unity), depending on the Presbytery, it is a very active group within the church and is widely recognized across the country by other denominations because they wear a uniform of a white shirt, a black skirt, and a white head wrap when executing their philanthropic duties. The group unites women around the Bible; they normally meet every Friday or Saturday for Bible studies at prayer houses. In addition, women play a huge role in times of bereavement and sickness of church members. They cheer the sick in homes and hospitals; console the bereaved by singing soothing songs; assist the elderly; care for widows and orphans; assist the needy, disadvantaged, and those who have reverted to bad habits;

look after the welfare of children; and provide leadership in congregations, prayer houses, presbyteries, and synods.

The Presbyterian church in Malawi continues to be a vibrant part of Malawi's religious and social landscape, contributing to the well-being and impacting the spiritual and social uplifting of the people of Malawi.

I'm honored to be asked to serve as an Elder, and I look forward to using my skills to give back to GPC for all the blessings that I have received.



# Gary Aller

I grew up in a churchgoing, non-religious household where church was only for Sundays. My faith journey started when I first became personally aware of God at 11 years old, and for the past 60 years I have been trying to figure this "God" thing out. My search has

led me to several faith traditions: Congregationalist, Lutheran, Presbyterian, Baptist, Episcopalian, non-denominational, para-church groups, and charismatic fellowships. I met a lot of wonderful Christians along the way, but I always had a hunger to push further on. I

felt there was a large gap between my understanding of who Jesus is and what he taught, and what I saw in the Church, the world, and myself.

One of my favorite passages is Jeremiah 9:23: "This is what the Lord says: Let not the wise man boast of his wisdom or the strong man boast of his strength or the rich man boast of his riches, but let him who boasts boast about this: that he understands and knows me, that I am the Lord who exercises kindness, justice and righteousness on earth, for in these I delight," declares the Lord.

"To understand and know me, declares the Lord" is what I continue to pursue, but always with the knowledge that it is a never-ending pursuit. 


