COST OF LIVING

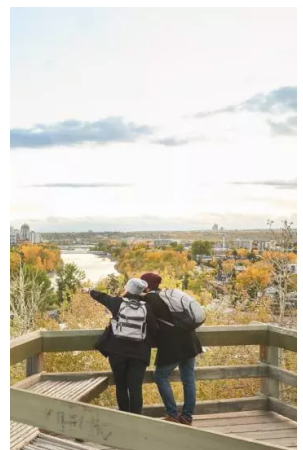
