13. What is the difference between a prescriptive part and a descriptive part of Scripture?
14. How would you describe Paul's method as he sought to make disciples?
15. In Matthew 28, Jesus sent his disciples to make disciples of all nations. In Mark 16, Jesus spoke about going to all creation. Jesus gave his disciples a gigantic task, but this work of carrying out the great commission begins with sharing Jesus' message with only one person. What can you know about each individual before you talk to him or her?

16. Why do you think Paul usually started out in a city preaching to Jews in synagogues?
17. How might Paul's method influence our approach to reaching others?
18. So, if someone wants to share the gospel, with whom would I recommend that they start?
19. Paul spoke to people in Pisidian Antioch who already knew a part of God's message (the Old Testament) but not everything (the fulfillment in Jesus). As you consider sharing the Word, why can it be helpful to identify what people know and then share what they do not know?
20. Write a list of ten people in your network: "Friends, Family, Acquaintances, and Neighbors" who would be willing to allow you to share the gospel with them.
