WHAT'S IN THE NAME

Decades prior to the Great Irish Potato

Famine, County Cork would send us their best and brightest, via NY and Boston, as the opening of the Erie Canal allowed for smooth passage into the spacious lands of Catholic welcoming Detroit.

But it was't until the famine began in the 1840s that Detroit would welcome the Irish en masse as they settled on the west side of downtown.

Centered around the the newly relocated Parish of the Holy Trinity Catholic Church, the area would finally start to define itself as Corktown - named for those who immigrated from County Cork, Ireland.




MOST HOLY TRINITY CHURCH 1050 PORTER ST.

YEAR 1866


The colorful history of this church can't be told without the mention of how the original small wooden building was hoisted up and rolled here from downtown so it could be physically closer to its Irish congregants.

And then, just so Sunday mass would continue without having to stop, the current church building, was purposely constructed with the older wooden church still inside and in use.

After completion in 1866 the old wooden church, still inside the new church, was torn down so the church's interior could be renovated.


