### Developing a heart of generosity

Rejoice always, pray without ceasing, give thanks in all circumstances! --1 Thessalonians 5:16-18

Dear Friends,

Would you like to be a more generous person, possessing a generous heart? Then I invite you to embrace gratitude as a spiritual practice. Since Thanksgiving is coming up this Thursday, this is a wonderful time of the year to give it a try.

Gratitude and generosity go together. Whether you're a millionaire or middle-class, when you are grateful for what you have, you'll likely be happier and more satisfied. You will see the world through eyes of abundance and be more likely to give of yourself—especially toward those who are struggling to get by. As Tabor Lutheran Church is a community of followers of Jesus Christ, we follow Jesus wherever He goes. And He's usually found with those seen as the "least of these".

How can we embrace gratitude as a spiritual practice? Paul gives us good advice.

Give thanks in all circumstances: Paul says give thanks IN all circumstances, not FOR all circumstances. In tough times, we can be grateful for what is going well and for the resources, relationships and faith that will help us through.

**Pray without ceasing**: Pray in the shower, in your car, on the beach, on your lunch break, at a stop light, in a grocery line. God hears all your prayers. Pray nonstop. Prayer isn't about coming up with eloquent-sounding words, prayer is a way of being. Prayer is as natural as breathing, yet our prayer lives are diminished when prayer becomes so cerebral. "Praying without ceasing" invites us to "get out of our heads" and simply be in the moment. Whatever it takes for you to get into the moment with the Divine, try it!

**Rejoice always:** Look for everyday celebrations every day. Do you have hot water? A car? Clean socks? food? Friends? Rejoice.

If you need a more disciplined approach, I recommend keeping a journal of your daily thanks, or a "gratitude list" that you can pray over and revise. Keep it up and it's a good bet that your developing "attitude of gratitude" will result in you becoming more generous and seeing the world through a lens of abundance.

Biblical stewardship IS about money; Jesus talks more about money than most other topics. But biblical stewardship goes far beyond simply being a 'patron' of Tabor Lutheran, or any other church. Biblical stewardship is rooted in gratitude, in seeing the world through the lens of 'thanksgiving'. Like many spiritual practices, it doesn't come naturally to us. That's because the world spins its own story, telling us what we lack, what we're at risk of losing, that we need to hold back and stock up, so we don't run out.

Biblical stewardship, especially as reflected by Paul, tells an alternative story: we have all that we need, given to us by a gracious and loving God. God loves us with a self-sacrificing love. God doesn't hold back or stock up; rather God gives the whole Divine self for us, as seen in the crucifixion of Jesus.

If we remain as merely 'patrons' of the ministry at Tabor Lutheran Church, we remain invested in the world's false story. Remember: throughout the Gospels, Jesus always challenges us to go a step farther. In going a step father in our giving, that means that we aren't only to be 'patrons', giving money with the expectation of getting a return on our investment. Jesus calls us all to be stewards—caring for the abundance that each of us has been giving, with special attention given to those who aren't as blessed. In turn, Tabor's mission isn't merely 'patron-driven', its driven by the desire to continue following after Jesus, going to the places Jesus goes, knowing that the Holy Spirit goes with us, and sharing our Creator's bounty with ALL of our neighbors.

I invite you to read Tony Kolowski's letter concerning stewardship; Tony is helping me spearhead a new 'Stewardship Team' at Tabor. As you prepare to call a 'settled' pastor (as opposed to an interim / 'transitional' pastor), Tabor would be well-served by having a more solid grounding in biblical stewardship, as I've described.

Until later, I hope you have a blessed Thanksgiving! I look forward to seeing you in worship, as we begin a new Church year with the season of Advent—preparing our hearts to receive God 'in the flesh' once again!

### **'Blue Christmas'** Service @ First Congregational Church, Branford Green (Dec. 21st) -- 7:00 P.M.

The 'Blue Christmas' service seeks to meet people where they are—especially if they do not feel joyful.

This service is designed to be a more 'friendly' service for those with young children and toddlers, as well as for those who don't worship often: Come as you are! You're welcome at Tabor!

How do we not just survive but rather THRIVE? Stewardship is rooted in scripture, recognizing we, as individuals, are not owners of our lives but rather are stewards or managers. Stewardship, quite simply is acknowledging that everything we have and everything we are is a gift from God and being grateful and generous with those gifts. It isn't only about giving but also doing. Tabor has a long standing reputation within the community of fulfilling its mission statement on an ongoing basis:

It is the Mission of Tabor Evangelical Lutheran Church to be: A blessed community in Christ that warmly welcomes people, across their lifespans, to worship and serve in varied and diverse ways, enthusiastically responding to God's call.

As members of Tabor's congregation, we continue to demonstrate our commitment to fulfilling this mission in many ways – Tabor's Preschool, various community outreach programs, seasonal and ad-hoc service projects, ministries including God's Work Our Hands, Community Dining Room, Branford Food Pantry – and participation with other local churches in activities /events that encourage and foster fellowship between congregations.



We at Tabor truly have a spirit of giving which comes from our hearts. It makes us feel good to do for



others in Jesus' name. Be reminded of the gospel story pastor Chad gave a sermon on a few weeks ago about the widow's offering (Mark 12:41 - 44), where Jesus sat with his disciples in the temple courts and witnessed many wealthy people contributing large amounts. Jesus points out the small gift made by a poor widow, emphasizing that she gave all that she had.

There are of course also times when we have to address the financial aspects of Tabor's mission. These include the regular operations that maintain the building and grounds, paying for needed repairs, janitorial services, staff salaries and meeting other financial obligations we have that keep our doors open. This has been especially difficult in recent years as we came out of the isolating and financially challenging environment of the pandemic. Nonetheless, we should remember that we are blessed with having a beautiful space to meet and engage in fellowship with each other. We should be

thankful for the less obvious small things that we may take for granted but that happen "behind the scenes" on a regular basis like the hired cleaning company that has the sanctuary and preschool classrooms vacuumed, the floors swept and the bathrooms mopped and sanitized. These are blessings that cannot be realized without the financial resources to pay for them.

Our current rate of income from envelope giving is projected to fall significantly short of the approved 2024-2025 budget. Once established, this working group will be responsible for developing a plan for how to best address the current shortfall and help ensure that our commitments for envelope giving are met. As a first step, the council has suggested that bi-weekly envelope giving be included in the Sunday Church bulletin. This will allow our church members to monitor progress towards achieving the goals of the Stewardship program on an ongoing basis.

The following is from The Rev. Nathan Pipho, bishop of the New England Synod of the ELCA, the synod to which Tabor Lutheran Church belong. Bishop Pipho puts out a monthly newsletter via email where he shares his thoughts, as well as what he has been up to in his ministry with the synod. Below, the bishop addresses the divisions that have been heightened in our country since the presidential election. Thank you for taking time to read this; congregations have permission to share the bishop's insights from his 'Bishop's Bulletin' newsletter.

### 'Bishop's Bulletin' - December 2024

--Rev. Nathan Pipho, bishop of the New England Synod, ELCA

The fear is real.

I have heard personally from many across the New England Synod who fear what the President-elect will do when he takes office in January. At the same time, I know others in the New England Synod voted for the President-elect and are hopeful for better days ahead.



This is my pastoral response to the 2024 Presidential elections: I offer Jesus Christ.

As I shared in the Bishop election last June, my number one priority in my ministry as your bishop would be to tell the story of Jesus. In this moment of human history and at this point in our nation's history, we continue to need Jesus as much as ever.

Regardless of how you voted, or how you feel about the outcome of the 2024 Presidential election, or what you believe will happen in the years to come, the story of Jesus is the good news of a savior who meets us in our fear and unites Republicans, Democrats, Independents, unaffiliated, voters, non-voters, citizens and non-citizens, in God's love announced for all people.

Earlier this fall, the ELCA Conference of Bishops released a statement that invites concrete and real ways we can live in the love of Jesus Christ in this moment in time. Here are the three actions from that statement I feel are the most important for all of us to take, regardless of how you voted in the 2024 election:

Boldly advocate for the marginalized and oppressed, emulating Christ's love for the least among us.

Lean in with curiosity, engage with those who think differently, and "put the best construction on our neighbor's action" (Luther's explanation of the Eight Commandment).

Resist deception and lift up the truth that all members of humanity are created in the image of God.

These are three real and powerful ways that together as the people of the New England Synod we can live out the love of Jesus for the good of our neighbors.

Together, let us boldly emulate Christ's love for the least among us through service and advocacy. As a church, we have historic commitments in caring for immigrants and more recently, have made public commitments to be a place of welcome and hospitality with lesbian, gay, bisexual, and transgender members and neighbors. As people of Christ, let us always be mindful of our neighbors in need, especially our neighbors facing mistreatment and violence. Together, let us truly listen and learn from those who voted differently than us rather than arguing and dismissing their thoughts and opinions. Stereotyping and generalizing people is always a diminishment of the humanity of others. As people of Christ, let us love one another and receive one another and each other's perspectives and insights.

Together, let us resist and reject the ways any of God's beloved children are blamed for society's ills and used as scapegoats. All humans are created in the image of God – no humans are aliens. As people of Christ, let us always insist on treating all humans, and speaking about all humans, as beloved siblings made in the image of God.

Democracy thrives on the civil, thoughtful and respectful debate of ideas in the public arena. We will and perhaps should, disagree on the specifics of policies and legislation. But even as we disagree, I urge us to be united on the basics: Christ calls us to love and serve our neighbors in need. Though we may disagree on the details, Christ always calls us to feed the hungry, clothe the naked, welcome the strangers, visit the prisoners and care for the sick. In our common life together, Christ always calls us to make God's love real through public policies that serve our neighbors in need.

The fear is real, but so is the love of Jesus.

Together, as one baptized communion of saints, let us find our hope and unity in the love of Jesus Christ. All are invited to come to the table and know the peace of the risen Jesus in bread and cup. All are invited to find hope that neither the cross nor death could conquer Christ's love. All are invited to know that the crucified and risen Christ loves all people and calls us to solidarity and sacrifice for the sake of our neighbors in need.

I wish you a safe and refreshing Thanksgiving holiday and a blessed Advent season.

On October 26, Tabor held their annual Octoberfest Pork Roast Dinner. We sold over 100 meals. Thanks to this community we raised over \$1500.












### Branford Food Pantry, Inc.

Tabor will collect these items and deliver to the Food Pantry.




### COFFEE TALK BOOK STUDY WITH PASTOR CHAD ADAMIK
