- The swell of Sunday music, or the voice of a young person quavering through being the worship leader for the first time.
- The din of people talking during coffee hour.

For all of it, and more, I'm grateful. I'm so thankful for my time as part of the GPC community. You all will be firmly in my prayers as God leads you into the next chapter.

### *QUIPS FROM EQUIPPING DISCIPLES*

Someone asked me [Carolyn Hayes] the other day, "What does Equipping Disciples really do? What are you equipping people to do?" I blinked a couple of times and answered, "We are equipping people to be

disciples." "So, what does that mean?" was their response. "Well, it's rooted in biblical study, supplemented with theological study, and through discussion and occasionally debate we try to understand what it all means to us in our lived lives." A not entirely blank look followed.

I continued: "Presbyterians believe that religious education doesn't end with confirmation or when you finish high school. Rather, it is just the foundation and we are called to be informed believers and life-long learners, who are then able, with deeper love and understanding, to share God's love with our immediate neighbors and throughout the world."

"So you're the nerds," they said. "Yeah, pretty much, but we're nerds with big hearts," I replied.

Equipping Disciples is the ministry responsible for Sunday School, Youth Group, Adult Ed, and the Young Families Ministry. That means we provide a variety of classes, such as Communion, Bible Basics, and Confirmation for our students; various Bible studies and Lenten and Advent studies; and other short-lived studies of particular books or topics for adults, as well as speakers of all sorts. We work with Congregational Life to provide intergenerational gathering opportunities, such as the 4th of July Picnic, the Fall Festival, the Ornament-Making Party, and the MLK Day of Service, because a big part of discipleship is fellowship.

### Rebuilding Together Montgomery County (RTMC) – Saturday, April 29

A group of 22 people (17 from GPC and 5 from St. Paul UMC in Laytonsville) gathered at a Silver Spring residence for GPC's annual community service project to help make a homeowner's house safer and more functional. In only one day they were able to make a noticeable difference both inside and outside the house. In addition to extensive yard clean-up (pruning bushes, raking, and removing trash), they performed multiple tasks inside the house, including replacing kitchen lighting, faucet, and 12'x12' floor; repairing stairs and handrail; replacing threshold between stairs and kitchen; installing smoke detectors on all levels; and replacing bathroom exhaust fan and vent, toilet, and showerhead.

# BEAUTIFYING OUR CHURCH GROUNDS

Under the auspices of the Buildings & Grounds Committee, the Creation Care Committee beautified our church grounds on

April 1. Special thanks to church members who have donated or plan to donate perennial plants from their gardens or local nurseries. Many thanks to the physical efforts of Pat Keziah and his grandson Daniel, Larry Masselink, Elisa McClelland, Suzie Ward, Laura Wilson, and Paul & Lisa Whitehead for weeding and planting the donated flowers. Another planting was held May 20.

#### Blooming for Easter Sunday:

- Fragrant white Candytuft with evergreen foliage that may rebloom in fall
- Vivid blue Forget-Me-Not, actually a short-lived perennial that reseeds readily
- Pale coral and yellow Columbine, a hybridized native
- Forsythia, large shrubs with early yellow flowers on arching stems

#### During the rest of the growing season, look for:

- Five varieties of ferns previously planted by Donna Dannels and Sue Eisenhour: native tall Ostrich Fern, striking silver/green/purple Japanese Painted Fern, glossy Japanese Holly Fern, Korean Tassel Fern (unfurls with tassels that disappear as leaves grow), and Korean Autumn Fern (fronds emerge coppery and mature to green)
- Natives purple Echinacea, Orange Coneflower, and golden Black-eyed Susan (our state flower)
- Natives tall Woodland Sunflower (prefers dappled shade) and White Turtlehead with flowers resembling snapdragons
- Pinks, whose rose-pink blooms pop amidst blue-green foliage
- English Lavender, whose purple blooms and leaves are fragrant
- Natives blue Aster and the orange milkweed Butterfly Weed, host to monarch butterflies
- Native False Blue Indigo, whose sky-blue flowers become rattling black seed pods
- Hummingbird Mint, a hybridized native with bold orange blooms, and native Narrowleaf Mountain Mint with white flowers

All of these are perennials, meaning that they rebloom year after year; many are native (helpful to local pollinators); most are deer resistant; and we should enjoy blooms from March through October. Enjoy the gifts of cooling plants, lovely colors and shapes, occasional fragrance, and wonderful pollinators.
