- no-cost and barrier-free counseling
- homeless youth case management
- on-site Drop-in Center and
- a new ten unit scattered-site transitional living program for 18 – 24 year olds

Growth in 2015

“I used to couch hop and now I own one!”

We love this young client’s quote because it symbolizes the transformation a young adult can experience over time with the counseling and case management offered at Teens Alone. It takes hard work. The young person has to be committed to cope, adapt and sometimes even change. Our counselors and case managers offer lots of support along the way.

We help teens and young adults graduate from high school, learn to get along with their parents, cope with anxiety and depression, assert themselves when friends take part in unsafe and risky behaviors, write a resume and provide a safety net as they launch their independent lives in their first apartments.

Our work is serious. Young people should be nurtured and protected, but homelessness among our community’s young people is a growing problem.

Agency staff sought and achieved positive change in 2015

Launching and building new programs to meet the needs of homeless and at risk young people was a goal last year for Teens Alone directors and staff. Little did they know the agency would also need to find a new location to serve the young people who need their help. It was a busy year, but the counselors’ and case managers’ talents proved to include both those that qualify them for the rewarding work they do, and the flexibility to adapt to change. Lots of change in a short period of time.

Some Teens Alone clients are referred to us by their parents - people who want to figure out how to keep their families together and encourage their kids to stay in school. Other young people we serve need Teens Alone staff to be the adults who help them learn to navigate their world. Some of them come to us with shaking hands and broken hearts. We offer a safety net to help them steer through their situations and find them safe housing when it’s needed.

Our approach is hopeful. We believe in every young person’s potential and are very proud of our successful programs and our talented, resourceful staff. We focus on teens and young adults with confidence and without judgment.

Our People

The Faces of Teens Alone

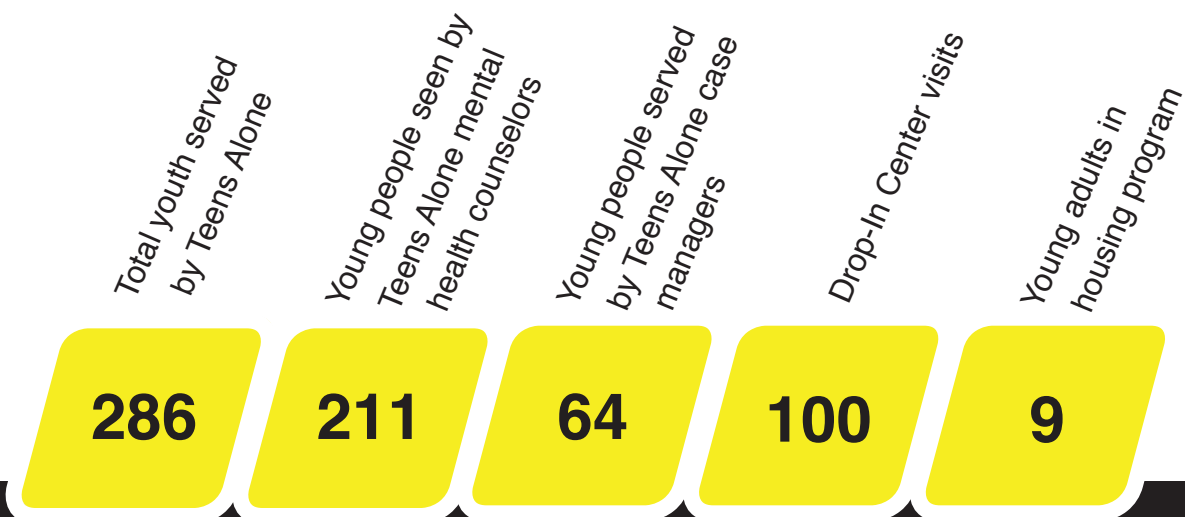
What do you think might be the common thread that describes the typical young person who benefits from Teens Alone services? It may surprise you to know that the defining theme among our youth receiving counseling is that they are striving to stay in school. Many are high-achieving students who take part in school activities. In most cases, school is a safe haven filled with supportive adults and our young people understand the importance of earning a high school diploma. It is also very common for trusted adults in these students' schools to be the people who refer them to Teens Alone.

In addition to striving to stay in school, many of the youth we

serve work 20-30 hours per week. It's not easy to struggle with adult problems when you're a student in our affluent suburbs. In addition to work and school, these kids may be couch-hopping, sleeping in cars and missing meals, all while trying to "keep up appearances." Teens Alone kids want to stay close to their schools where they feel safe, knowing our staff will do everything we can to support them.

So, how best to describe the faces of Teens Alone? We are reminded on a daily basis that their need is great but, they are working very, very hard to overcome the challenges in their lives. They are students. They are hard workers. They are your neighbors.

Teens Alone kids aren't just numbers to us, but we did serve a lot of them in 2015:





Key plans and accomplishments:

We launched two new programs based upon community need.

While the bedrock goals of Teens Alone services are counseling and keeping kids with their families, the reality is that some young people are forced into early independence. Struggling against the odds, some young people are almost ready, but need support. We launched our Transitional Living Program (TLP) to serve them. We help 18-24 year olds find a safe place to lease and initially help them pay their rent. It's a rigorous program. To qualify, they must work at least 20 hours per week and show that they're prepared for the big steps of keeping house, managing a budget and being a good neighbor. Our case managers help them learn to manage the details and our counselors offer mental health support. As they become accustomed to their new living situation, they gradually assume more and more of their share of the rent until they're ready to pay it on their own. We started with eight apartments and hope to expand this program with the help of the TLP Council, comprised of the TLP renters, acting as our advisory board.

This year, we wanted to reach out to more young people with unstable housing who might be couch hopping, sleeping in cars or on the streets. Many Teens Alone clients are referred to us by school counselors. But many young adults who are over 18 aren't attending school. In addition to the need for outreach, our staff saw the need for a relaxed place that would provide a link to our case managers and counselors as well as help young people with immediate needs. Our answer is the new Drop-in Center (the first west-suburban site of its kind), a comfortable place for young people to visit and connect with Teens Alone services on weeknights. There's always a Teens Alone staff person available to help them with anything from finding a bed for the night to working on their resume.

A wrench was thrown into our plans, but we ended up better off for it.

It was unsettling to learn in Spring, 2015 that our landlord leased our space to a more profitable tenant. We didn't love our space. The new Drop-in Center and most of the staff were located in the basement. A small agency split between two levels was less than ideal. Our counselors' and case managers' desks were all crowded into a small corner of the basement with no windows. But, for 25 years, it was the only "home" we'd ever had.

We found the perfect office space in an even better location. Teens Alone will move to the Eisenhower Community Center in Hopkins in Fall, 2015. Now the Drop-in Center will be on the same level right beside our offices. It will be even warmer and more inviting with natural light and private offices for our staff. The building's receptionist will greet our clients and volunteers. We will have access to many other building amenities.

Perhaps best of all, our rent situation will remain the same, thanks to the generosity of the Hopkins School District who agreed to maintain our "in-kind" relationship for leased space. Because it believes in our success rate in helping students stay in school, the district paid our rent on Main Street. When we are located in "Ike" - a school district building - the district will allow us to continue to serve young people in the new space at no cost.



Our Programs

Teens Alone has now served our community's teens and young adults for 25 years. We continue to believe in and employ our three pronged approach to serving young people: prevention, intervention and crisis services are all required to keep our area's students safely housed and help them graduate from high school.

Free, Confidential Teen and Family Counseling

We continued to provide barrier-free, no-cost counseling services, often responding to crisis calls and walk-ins.

School and Community Crisis Prevention Groups

Teens Alone coordinated and facilitated various group sessions in our area schools (e.g. anxiety, chemical health and Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Transgender and Questioning).

Case management

Our case managers helped young people navigate and manage the daunting world of early independence.

Housing Program

Our new Transitional Living Program helps prepare and launch young people for living on their own as they learn to manage a budget, take care of a home and be a good neighbor, with mental health support from Teens Alone counselors.

Drop-in Center

Our new Drop-in Center offers an outreach vehicle to find the young adults who will benefit from Teens Alone services and provides a place they can visit to connect with our staff and resources without an appointment.

Homeless Youth Advocacy

Most youth served by Teens Alone are ultimately safely housed. Within this group, the majority of teens under 18 end up staying with their families.

Community Capacity Building

Teens Alone continued to provide leadership in recruiting and developing housing options for homeless teens and emerging adults in our service area, including the Suburban Host Home Program.

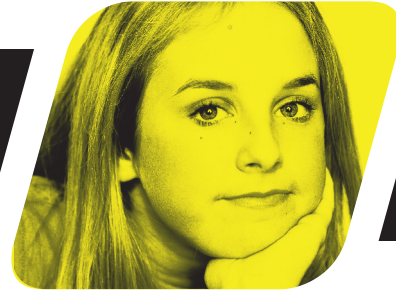
