Fertility counseling has become a fast-growing field and has proven to be crucial as family building options continue to advance, which includes the use of donor conception. Couples and individuals are asked to make decisions quickly, sometimes with little support and are often encouraged to attend a donor recipient consultation. In these cases, a trained mental health professional with knowledge of the psychological impact of infertility becomes key in helping couples and individuals slow down, while understanding these decisions are robust and complicated. Considerations for disclosure in donor-assisted reproduction: Helping recipients understand its purpose

Donor conception has proven to be a successful option for many couples and individuals to build their family.
