# From the Heart of Pastor Mary Austin HOLIDAY MEMORIES

Dear GPC Members and Friends -

"What was the name of our math teacher?" a friend might ask you. Or, "What was that movie with that actor who was also in \_\_\_\_?" You

might need to ask someone what you had for dinner last Christmas, or where you bought some great item. People who live together are always asking, "Have you seen the \_\_\_\_?"

We're used to outsourcing our memory to devices. It turns out that we also entrust it to other people. We don't have to recall everything because other people are remembering, too. Scientists call this "transactive memory"—memory that's shared in a group of people. This explains one layer of the grief we feel when we lose a longtime friend, or when a partner slips into dementia, or when a sibling dies. We lose a chunk of our own memories, along with their presence.

The church is the best place on earth for transactive memory. We have not just decades of it, but centuries. In Advent, we share the memories of Christians before us who have longed for the presence of Jesus in the world, who waited for him to be born, and who are waiting for his return. In a discouraging year, or century, we catch hope from one another again, and move into our shared anticipation.

This is our third Advent of waiting for life to return to "normal," whatever that was. We're still off-kilter, making mental calculations about coming to church in person, traveling, and seeing people in groups.

Advent shapes our waiting into a spiritual practice and reminds us that we're not waiting hopelessly. God has come to be with us, and will come again, and remains with us. We delve into our shared memory to remind ourselves that we are people of hope, and that Jesus is coming to us again, as God's gift.

You are in my prayers for a wealth of hope this Advent and Christmas.

### **MANY BLESSINGS**

Your grammar teacher will thank me. It turns out that verb tense really is important. John 1:5 says, "The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it." Some English Bibles translate this into the past tense—the light shone in the darkness, the darkness did not overcome it. But the original text is clear. The light of Christ still is shining and the shadows and pain and suffering of this world still have not overcome it.

Not war, not inflation, not poverty, not racism, not climate change, not gun violence. The light of God that is the Second Person of the Trinity still shines today.

As disciples of Jesus, we are called to bear witness to that Light and to shine the light that is within us. We are to be Christ to each other—to listen to a neighbor, share our food with the hungry, work against injustice, support the vulnerable, visit the sick, and change the world. We don't do these things in our own strength, but only in the strength of Christ within us.

The light shines in the darkness, and the darkness has not overcome it. We hear this verse often in Advent and at Christmas, but it can carry us into the new year as well. Affirm this declaration daily, and let it change your life. Elsewhere in this issue you will find opportunities to shine the light and share the love of Jesus.

## **OUR ADVENT BOOK**



In this daily devotional for Advent, Christmas, and Epiphany, Jill J. Duffield draws readers' attention to ten ordinary objects that appear in the biblical narratives of messianic prophesy and incarnation— objects we encounter in our own lives. Through objects such as gates, trees, cloth, light, and water, readers will find new meaning in the biblical account of Jesus' coming. By connecting everyday objects with biblical texts, Advent in Plain Sight prompts readers to see the near kingdom of heaven on earth and ponder what that divine proximity enables and asks them to do and be. Each daily devotional features a Scripture reading, prayer, and reflection, reminding Christians that God still dwells among us, even in the most ordinary places."



#### MONTGOMERY PHILHARMONIC CONCERT Sunday, December 11, at 6:30 p.m.



## OUR THREE FINAL FEATURED COMMITTEES HELP Equip, fund, and staff gpc

What a year this has been as we've successfully transitioned from COVID Shutdown to Open Church Activities! Through it all, our pastors, church leaders, and committees have been hard at work to keep us connected and moving forward. We couldn't do that without direction, funding, and staff. #### EQUIPPING DISCIPLES COMMITTEE

One of the key principles of Reformed faith is continuing faith education. The Equipping Disciples Committee takes that idea very much to heart for children, youth, and adults. Our Mission Statement reads: "To call, equip and nurture each generation to be and become effective and committed disciples of Jesus Christ by providing individuals of all ages with the knowledge and tools to grow in their faith, creating relationships that foster and sustain such growth and equipping and encouraging members for the work of Christ in their families, the church, and in the world." In other words, our ministers are teachers in the worship setting, and we are the teaching ministry by and for lay people.

The committee works alongside many wonderful church members, who serve as leaders for a variety of classes and Small Groups to provide a wide range of options—from Bible Studies of various kinds, to a study of Christian Classic literature, to book discussions and activities focused on social justice issues. The classes, often as not, become functional Small Groups, because many of them have met for years—with its members learning, laughing, and supporting one another through life's challenges. This is true for children and youth, as well as adults. So, we are also and intentionally in the business of fellowship.

Our intentionality about fellowship is evidenced by our not quite quarterly churchwide events—the Fall Festival; the Ornament-Making Party at the beginning of Advent; and the Fourth of July Picnic. We also host a Movie Night the first Friday of most months. We've collaborated with Congregational Life on many of these wonderful events, which have been enjoyed by our own folks as well as folks in the community. This program year we are looking forward to bringing speakers on a variety of topics to GPC: perhaps climate change and ways to reduce our carbon footprints, or new and different ways for parents to bring faith alive in their homes, or strategies for people who are transitioning from their working lives to making the most of their retirement years. These are just a few ideas, and we welcome yours and potentially your help if you feel called to lead any of these studies, discussions, and/or fellowship events.

Although we are committed to adult education, most people think first of educating our children and youth, which are indeed important components of the ministry as a whole. Sunday worship services include a Children's Message, and on Sundays that are not communion Sundays or connected to a school holiday, the children and youth are excused for education and fellowship. We regularly provide a workshop for families so that their children understand and appreciate communion and also a Bible workshop. To accommodate families unable to attend worship and Sunday School, we provide a recorded version of Sunday School and Godly Play each week along with an e-bulletin.

Carrie and her team of youth advisors offer a confirmation class each spring. In addition to a very active youth group (Wednesday Night Youth Thing) she is also actively working with the families in the Frederick area (Friends in Frederick) to help keep them in touch with one another and the church, and also has an active college ministry. Carrie also works with several churches in the area to provide workshops on topics important to families with middle and high school age kids, as well as really great fellowship activities with the kids from the other churches. Whitney Fauntleroy not only brings us amazing sermons, but she also works with the Young Adults to bring them together for faith, fellowship, and fun. You may not have realized that Equipping Disciples has such a broad reach!

The Equipping Disciples Committee currently consists of Andy Imboden (chair), Cindy Cenname, John Hastings, Carolyn Hayes (staff liaison), Carrie Larsen, Steve Olin, Akiko Taketani, and Suzie Ward. We meet via Zoom on the second Monday of each month at 1:30 p.m. If you think that you might be interested in joining us, contact Carolyn Hayes for the Zoom link. We'd love to see you!

# **GPC COMMITTEES (CONT'D)**

#### FINANCE COMMITTEE



In a typical not-for-profit organization scenario, a finance committee would only look at the financial well-being of the whole organization in pursuit of its missions and projects. As a PC(USA) member, however, GPC must be guided by its prescribed rules, as follows:

"The role of the finance committee is to support the treasurer in implementing the various financial policies of the session. They can help the treasurer in the budget development, overseeing investments, developing draft policies for session approval, selecting and approving financial secretaries and counters, and other appropriate tasks. They usually will review the current financial report on a monthly (timely) basis and communicate with the session when things seem out of order or when a group in the church is reaching the limit of their budget for the year. The finance committee usually does not make financial decisions unless they have been authorized to do so by the session.

Although, as an independent church, we don't operate strictly that way, GPC's Finance Committee has made the PC(USA) order a routine in conducting business. Our responsibilities, as charged by the Session, can be summarized as follows:

- Create GPC's annual general budget, incorporating the individual budgets of each committee of the church
- Set aside and manage reserves for unforeseen situations
- Produce and report on monthly and annual finances to keep the Session apprised of budget projections, spending, offerings, and any other relevant data
- Protect the church assets by working with the Session to create policies that mitigate and prevent such circumstances as fraud. embezzlement, and other events that can potentially disrupt GPC's financial survival as a community of faith
- Keep a close eve on how GPC's financial resources are spent and what kind of debts it can support so that, if necessary, reserve funds can be initiated and sustained in order to stay on budget
- Make the Session aware of the state of GPC's budget and how it has been managed so that, in

collaboration with the Stewardship Committee, they can inform and solicit the congregation for unforeseen expenses and needs

The Finance Committee is responsible for a significant part of the church's well-being and success, and participation by its members requires a significant amount of time, patience, and knowledge.

Over the last couple of years, the Finance Committee was able to:

- Streamline payroll and W-2 production.
- Make it easier for GPC members to donate, especially by adopting and implementing Pushpay software.
- Strengthen our cooperation with the Stewardship Committee in order to propose the annual budget timely.
- Conduct timely annual audits with the Accounting Manager.
- Recover money drafted from GPC's bank account with a counterfeit check.

As 2022 ends, our main goal in light of the repairs underway is to encourage and call the entire congregation to a common effort of replenishing the Capital Maintenance Reserve (CMR), which has been almost depleted below the Session's set limit.

Finance Committee members are usually elected by the congregation, but they may be appointed and approved by the Session as well. Current members are Phil Melberg, Raymond Raven (chair), Joyce Schumacher, and Steve Ward. Pastor Mary Austin and the Accounting Manager participate in meetings as guests from time to time. Meetings are held via Zoom on the second Tuesday of the month at 7:00 p.m. GPC members are welcome to contribute to the dynamism and effectiveness of ways the congregation could improve the church's financial outlook. The Nominating Committee and the Session as a whole will be responsible for making any final decisions, however.

#### HUMAN RESOURCES COMMITTEE



God counts on a village to make His church work in the world. In Romans 12, as well as other places in the Bible, we read about how God gives gifts to His people for the

purpose of using them to His glory. Gaithersburg Presbyterian Church is blessed with a gifted team of professionals dedicated to leading the membership in the worship, fellowship, and education opportunities vital for a healthy relationship and a life of abiding in Him. The Human Resources (HR) Committee supports the Senior Pastor/Head of Staff in building a healthy work environment for the professional staff and tapping into the multifaceted gifts of the congregation. HR's primary functions support all church employees by assuring that best employment practices are documented and followed, and that position descriptions and compensation are developed and administered appropriately. HR also staffs hiring actions for the nonpastoral staff, including the development of position descriptions, recruitment, and interview of applicants.

Most of the activities of the committee repeat annually. An extensive effort was made several years ago to revamp and rewrite the Human Resources Manual; however, the committee discusses periodic changes to the Manual as the need arises. The committee ensures that human resources practices, including compensation, comply with PC(USA) and Presbytery policies, and local, state, and Federal employment laws. The committee provides annual performance feedback to the Senior Pastor, but personnel management activities for the remaining staff are administered by the Head of Staff.

The National Capital Presbytery provides an annual recommendation for compensation for the pastoral staff, which is reviewed by the committee and recommendations are presented to the congregation for approval. Salary adjustments for non-pastoral employees are reviewed at least annually to reflect fairness. equity, and market-competitiveness. Compensation recommendations for these staff members are implemented through the budget process and do not require congregational approval. A review of staff compensation was completed recently, resulting in some adjustments to improve parity. Costs for contracted support staff (such as the Communications Manager) are also regularly reviewed.

Staff liaison to HR is Mary Austin, Head of Staff. Elder Lucy Nzelle is the Session liaison and Committee Chair. Members serve two-year terms with a maximum of four consecutive years. Current committee members are Gary Aller, Pam Clinch, Sue Farrand, Sally Rush, and Steve Ward. The committee holds closed meetings on the fourth Monday of each month and ad hoc as needed.

### LEARNING TO BE STEWARDS OF GOD'S CREATION

"... Whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers of mine, you did for me." — Matthew 25:40

Clearly, Jesus calls us to give generously from our goods and talents to the least of these. In Matthew 25:19–28, Jesus also illustrates that we all need to be thoughtful stewards of all He has given us. By thoughtful caring for Creation, we can better care for the "least of these," who especially suffer from environmental destruction.

How can we become better stewards of God's Creation? Many Presbyterians across the country are becoming part of the "Creation Care" movement. Now some members of GPC are forming a "Green Team" to develop plans to educate themselves and take action within and outside the GPC community to better care for the environment and our neighbors.

On Sunday, October 16, at the Adult Education Fair, several Green Team organizers shared proposed ideas and materials for the expansion of the Green Team and a Creation Care class expected to begin in January. Several GPC congregants signed up to become involved in the brainstorming and developmental stage and showed interest in the class, which will focus on how we can be the hands and feet of Jesus one "green step" at a time.
