If you've ever wondered how important the cottage is to a family who cottages, consider this: Tony and Allison Willson bought theirs when they'd been dating just nine months. They got engaged here. And because they were renting in Toronto at the time, the cottage, which they get up to most weekends throughout the year, was essentially their first home. Interesting, then, that Allison, a designer with Sarah Richardson Design, decided to take things slowly when it came to decorating the four-bedroom home. A full three years slowly. But, when it was finally done, it virtually radiated a warm, inviting charm that's simultaneously stylish and stay-awhile-and-sink-in cosy.

"We really needed to take time to figure out how we wanted to live ... together," says Allison. "We hadn't bought a stick of furniture before. We needed to figure out our direction — how we wanted it to feel. To ask, 'What do you like? What do I like?' I think, in the end, I was given pretty free rein, though I considered Tony absolutely. I wanted it to reflect who we are as a couple, but also as individuals."

This part of Balsam Lake in Ontario's Kawarthas region has been home to Willsons for generations. Allison, a firsttime owner by contrast, was determined to get the look right. The couple spent dozens of weekends in the cottage, built 10 years ago by Tony's uncle, before changing a thing.

That's not to say they didn't spend countless hours at markets in the country and vintage stores in Toronto to hunt down furniture for the cottage. "I couldn't pass one without walking through the doors," Allison says. But the design process, she says, took at least a couple of summers to complete. "It was important that our cottage was inviting — comfortable in a way that felt collected." Spoken like someone truly appreciative of the innate charm found in the best cottages. "I don't think I'd adopt the same method in a city house, but cottages need a bit of whimsy to them; your life is more casually on display at a cottage," she says. "I love the relaxed vibe created when pieces from a million different places come together."


It must be daunting for a designer to marry into a cottage family — to respect the sense of place and heritage, while also bringing her own aesthetic and ideas to the table. But Allison never had any intention of taking on a big renovation. She left the cottage's layout untouched, save for the kitchen, where the window was so tiny the space was dark as night by 2 p.m. each afternoon.
