T: Rainforest Wonders

Taught by Beckie Olupot

All Ages 7

Today in Rainforest Wonders, we learned about the sloth and the anteater and how each one is uniquely created to thrive in its environment.

Homework -

1st-3rd (for those who want to, since we didn't have time to do it in class): Anteater Craft: Using two toilet paper rolls, create an anteater. Use one for the anteater's body, and then cut the other one into parts (head, with its long snout, four legs, and tail). Glue or tape these parts onto the other TP roll to complete the body. Color and add eyes. Add a tongue by poking a small hole in the front and rear of the body, and then thread a string or yarn through the holes so it comes out the mouth. Tape or glue a small paper ant to the end of the string. Pull gently on the string to make it look like the anteater's long tongue is catching the ant.

4th-6th: Choose either the sloth or the anteater. Draw a picture of your chosen animal in its rainforest habitat. Write 2–3 sentences describing one unique adaptation it has and how that adaptation helps it survive.

This week, our class watched The Magic School Bus: Taking Flight! In this episode, Ms. Frizzle and the kids explore how airplanes actually fly. We learned about the four main forces of flight — lift, thrust, drag, and weight — and how the shape of an airplane's wings helps it rise into the air. We also discovered how parts like the tail and rudder help steer and keep the plane steady. After the show, everyone designed and tested their own paper airplanes, predicting how far or high they might go.

For homework, students are testing their planes in different spots — up high, outside in the wind, and on flat ground — and writing down what happens. We can't wait to see what they observe next week!

's Rube's World of Simple Machines

Today's simple machine is the pulley. What makes up a pulley and how it can make our work easier. We saw the difference between using a single pulley vs. multiple pulleys when we have to lift very heavy objects.

Homework:

Part 1: Observation

Look around your home, playground, or neighborhood and try to spot something that uses a pulley (examples: flagpole, blinds, garage doors, exercise equipment). Draw or describe what you saw.

Part two: Imagine a pulley job

Think of a chore or task at home that feels hard to do, like lifting a heavy bag. Pulling something up high or carrying an item upstairs. Draw or write how you would use a pulley system to make that job easier.


To IEW Adventures in Writing

6th-8th

Today we started by learning about strong verbs! This is our 3rd "dress-up" that is required in this next and future essays. We learned that weak verbs (see/said and think/thought) are to be avoided and replaced with verbs that convey a greater depth of meaning. There are lists in the app (free version available) and in the Student Resource Packet download (find info on that blue page at the beginning of the student book or TM). Then, we began lesson 7 (we will take TWO WEEKS to complete, rather than one) and read about the Greek myth of Pheidippides and the Battle of Marathon.

Homework: Complete the KWO and style practice pages from the lesson (pg. 59-62), excepting the vocabulary practice, which we will do next week. For those who use the assignment schedule at the beginning of the lesson, complete the lesson through "Day 2, step 3."

8th - 12th

Topic for the day - avoiding plagiarism. We studied examples of paraphrasing that are NOT plagiarizing and ones that ARE definitely plagiarism. They are going to be practicing paraphrasing for homework. We also learned how to use parenthetical citing in our papers (more on that later). The students have 4 articles, which we have been annotating and/or making note cards from, that will be the sources of their paper. They all gave me their note card boxes for me to look over and grade them. Next, we looked at a citation generating website and I showed them how to use it to create a "Works Cited" page. The free website I used is <u>citationmachine.net</u>. Because it is free, there are a lot of ads, which is distracting, so if you are tech savvy and want to use a different one, there are many out there.

Homework: Complete the paraphrasing exercise #8 on pgs. 48-49. Create a "Works Cited" page of the 4 sources (articles) they have been using for their research (exercise 9, pg. 50). **Parents: the TM contains the answers for exercise 9 on page 75-76 (note: there are 8 sources cited, we only are using 4).

In Michigan History this week, we learned about the War of 1812 and why Michigan was such an important place for protecting our country's borders. We read a story about Sophie, a brave little girl who lived in Fort Detroit when the British took over. The students made a classroom "quilt" by drawing pictures of important items from the war. Their homework is a word search to review some of the new words we learned.

4th-6th Grades

In Michigan History, we studied the War of 1812 and learned about major events and leaders. We watched a short video explaining how the war affected Michigan and the United States. Then, students divided into teams for a "Peace Treaty Debate"—half represented the British and the other half the Americans—to decide who wanted peace more. For homework, each student will write a diary entry from the point of view of someone who lived during the war. (Paper was sent home.)

We reviewed the digestive system today.

Measured out 20 feet - the length of our small intestine!

Created a mock stomach with a baggie, bread, and water to mimic how chyme is formed by our stomach before entering the small intestine.

Be sure to ask your student to see their human on pg. 15 of the notebook! So far, we've added our skeleton, skeletal muscles, renal system, and digestive system.

Homework:

Text: Review/skim p. 69-80

Notebook: p. 58-59, Digestive pocket A15-A20, glue to page 62


Ask your students to see their human on p. 15 in the notebook!

Exploring Creation with Anatomy (8-12) Taught by Silvia Duthie

8th - 12th

Monday HS Anatomy - continuing in Module 4, we focused on how the body builds and repairs bones and how specific hormones affect calcium levels in the blood, which are essential to life. Tomorrow, we will use microscopes to complete the lab for this module, and hopefully finish up the module. I'm considering adding one more day if we can't cover all of the material in time.

Bring lab books tomorrow! <u>Make sure all homework is complete by next Monday. Notes from today are in the pictures.</u> Excellent work today.

Tuesday HS Anatomy: For lab day, the students used the microscopes to look at the differences between cancellous bones versus compact bones. We had enough time after the lab to go over the rest of the chapter. We discussed how hormones play a role in final growth and the stopping of growth. We also discussed the anatomical position and anatomical terms used in the medical field. Excellent work today. Reminder: Next Monday is the test for Module 4, which is an open book exam, no notecards. Bring all of your finished homework for credit, to include your coloring book, OYO and SGQ's.
