

Main Passage: John 5:1-11 (NLT)

Afterward Jesus returned to Jerusalem for one of the Jewish holy days. Inside the city, near the Sheep Gate, was the pool of Bethesda, with five covered porches. Crowds of sick people—blind, lame, or paralyzed - lay on the porches. One of the men lying there had been sick for thirty-eight years. When Jesus saw him and knew he had been ill for a long time, he asked him, "Would you like to get well?"

"I can't, sir," the sick man said, "for I have no one to put me into the pool when the water bubbles up. Someone else always gets there ahead of me."

Jesus told him, "Stand up, pick up your mat, and walk!"



Read John 5:1-11

When Jesus looks at you, He see's more than meets the eye. What do you think Jesus saw in the sick man at the pool that made him stop and ask the question "do you want to be healed"? What do you think Jesus sees when he looks inside of you?

Our friend at the pool could have become way too comfortable with his circumstances. What's the danger of becoming comfortable? Is there a difference in being comfortable vs. being content? What do you think God is asking of you? Do a self-check; are there areas of your life where you have grown comfortable?

Our friend's ailment at the pool of Bethesda had become his whole identity. For 38 years, it was all about a problem and an impossible answer. If you are not careful, your circumstances or environment can consume your identity. How can you be intentional about not letting this happen? What are some tools you might use to ensure that this won't happen to you?

Jesus asks tough questions in our lives to expose the true cost of our desires. What were some of the cost our friend at the pool was being asked to pay? Why is paying those cost so difficult at times? What might God be asking of you right now?

[LEAD (YOURSELF)]

A life with Christ will ask a lot of you. One thing this journey requires is complete and total focus on God and God alone. Take a spiritual inventory; is there an area of your life that you need to refocus on God? What is your identity? Have you allowed circumstances or situations to cause you to not live your best life? If so, what are you going to do to change that?
