VETERANS DAY - A HISTORY

Veterans Day used to be called Armistice Day. It became a holiday in 1938. This holiday honors all military veterans who served our country.

WHEN DID IT START AND WHY?

It was made to remember the end of World War I. At first, it only celebrated World War I veterans. Now, it honors all veterans, whether they served in war or peace. President Dwight D. Eisenhower changed the name to Veterans Day to honor more heroes.

WHEN IS VETERANS DAY?

Every year, Veterans Day is on November 11th. This date is special because it marks the end of World War I on the 11th hour of the 11th day of the 11th month in 1918. Many countries, like Canada, Great Britain, and Australia, also celebrate this day and call it Remembrance Day. On this day, we thank veterans for their service and sacrifices.

WHO IS CELEBRATED AND HOW?


Veterans Day also shows the diverse group of people who served in the military. For example, 11% of veterans are women. About 19 million veterans live in the U.S. now. Veterans are honored in many ways. One special place is Arlington National Cemetery in Virginia, where many soldiers and their families are buried. The first Veterans Day celebration was in Alabama. New York City has the biggest and oldest Veterans Day parade, starting in 1919.

IS IT THE SAME AS MEMORIAL DAY?

This day is different from Memorial Day. Veterans Day honors all who have served, while Memorial Day remembers those who died in military service. Both days let us think about the bravery and sacrifices of our armed forces.

How do we get better at any skill? We practice. If you want to be a better free-throw shooter, you get on the line and shoot free throws. If you want to be a faster swimmer, you get in the pool. The same is true for writing. The more we do it, the better we get.

In my classroom, this looks like ten minutes of writing every day. We start at five minutes a day the first week and build up, adding a minute a week, until we reach ten. The prompts in this resource will help you make that practice fun and engaging and also purposeful. The prompts will cover a variety of high interest topics, purposes and forms including fiction, nonfiction, and reflections, with an emphasis on building stamina, idea generation, and enjoyment. When applicable, I call out the genre focus and/or specific skill being practiced. Also, below you can see a list of Common Core State Standards (CCSS) that are routinely addressed and covered by doing these daily writing prompts.

Writing CCSS: W 6-8.2, W 6-8.3, W 6-8.4, W 6-8.5, W 6-8.9, W 6-8.10

If you want, keep these "curriculum and standard" pieces of information to yourself, go for it! There is no need to let the kids know we have a secret plan to trick them into being better writers and hating it a little bit less each day!


You can either print the following prompt pages for students to directly write on (and then keep in a folder/binder) or project the prompt (via these <u>SLIDES</u>) onto a whiteboard/screen and have students do their writing in a dedicated notebook. Whatever works best for you... go for it!

My hope is that the daily practice becomes something that students look forward to rather than dread. I hope that as students see the words and ideas pile up, their confidence grows. I hope that by having this resource of high-quality, ready to go prompts, your life will be made just little bit easier!


TAKEAWAYS

Even silly prompts ("Would you rather have pizza every day or ice cream every day?") still help students practice the serious structure of argumentative writing—without the intimidation of "real" essay topics. This lowers the stakes while reinforcing core skills.

WE WANT STUDENTS TO BE ABLE TO:

- Choosing a side → Making a clear claim.
- Backing it up \rightarrow Giving 2–3 strong reasons with evidence or examples.
- Using transitions → Showing relationships between ideas.
- Acknowledging the other side → Strengthening their argument.
- Concluding clearly → Wrapping up their reasoning in a persuasive way.

Hey there, Teacher Friend!

Theme can be a hard lesson to teach, in part because it feels (especially to a middle schooler) so abstract. This lesson is my attempt to make this story element more concrete (and hopefully engaging and fun).

First, introduce or review theme through direct instruction slides and note taking sheets as well as literary and film examples (links included for read aloud and film clips).

Then, their knowledge into action! Print pages 9-19 for a group exploration activity. Make them big! Laminate them for reuse... or keep them as single pages and have students rotate from table to table recording their ideas... it's up to you and what you think will work best for you/your students/your classroom environment.

On each poster, students will record books and movies they think showcase the targeted theme. There is also a space for them to include evidence to support their choice. Set a timer, give students a dedicated time at each poster and the rotate. Hopefully, seeing other examples will jog their memory and help them think of more examples. If you are worried they won't be able to come up with any at the first station on their own, add one in yourself to get them going.

After students have been to all the stations, share the themes and their examples aloud. Ask students which they think best exemplifies each theme and why. Each individual or small group could prepare a statement to share with the class, identifying their choice and argument in favor of their exemplar example. (page 15) Then, share them aloud! Perhaps a healthy discussion will ensue! (At least, that is my goal/hope!) A rubric for evaluating their written responses is included. (page 16/17)

Finally, vote! Come up with a BEST EXAMPLE LIST and post it in your classroom. In future class periods, compare the results from class to class. Bonus tip: Have some of the books the students mention on hand to disperse to students suddenly interested in checking them out. And one last idea, you could do a grade level vote for the movies that were suggested and watch it as a reward for excellent engagement and participation.

The main character wrestles with the question: Who am I? "Identity" refers to the qualities that make one person different from another. How much of a difference exists between one person and another? Is that different important? Why?

Theme: Justice

The literary theme of survival applies to stories about being about fighting against nature to stay alive, but it also applies to stories about the survival of ideas, groups, and society/humanity-at-large.



Step 1:

Read chapter 1 of your chosen story. You can either do this directly from a physical copy of the book, or if you don't have access to the book, head to Amazon.com and click "read sample".



Step 3:

Watch the movie. Watch as long as you'd like, but I recommend (for the sake of the activity) to watch until the end of the chapter I event. Later you can come back and watch more as a reward for finishing the book/activity/etc. You know your school best, so watch via DVD/Streaming/etc. as your school allows. Do not just show the trailer... more on this soon. :)

Step 2:

Go to <u>ScreenWritersNetwork.org</u> and search for your movie script. You can either print a few pages of the script or have students read directly from the website. To help your students understand the lingo and abbreviations that come with this format, <u>use this brief slideshow</u>.

Step 4:

Compare! Using the next few pages, record important information about each version of the story and then, look for similarities and differences. Use these as the pre-writing phrase for any longer pieces of writing you'd like your students to complete.




Compare and Contrast


Find a book that has been turned into a movie. Read the book's blurb (summary on the back cover or inside flap or Amazon description) and also watch the movie version trailer (search on YouTube). Then compare and contrast these two "introductions" to the story. If you are stuck, ask yourself the below questions to generate some ideas.

Questions to ask yourself:

- 1. Was character or plot more strongly emphasized? How did this focus impact my first impression?
- 2. Did the "introduction" lean heavily into the celebrity status of the author/creators/actors?
- 3. What additional elements (images, sound effects, music, visuals, endorsements, awards) were present? How did they affect your first impression?



Overall, which introduction version (the blurb or the movie trailer) did a better job of making you want to read/experience the story? Why? Be specific! What elements pulled you in?



Option 1

Using what you now know about screenplays, write a script for you and a partner (or small group) introducing your audience to a story that has been turned into both a book and a movie. In your script highlight several positive features from each form. Encourage your audience to experience both versions and then make up their mind about which was better, the book or the movie. Practice your script and then perform it for your classmates!

Option 3

Create a powerpoint or slide show presentation explaining the differences between the multiple versions of the story. Add in your opinions and how you think the author would feel about the way their story is being presented now. Do your best to include specific examples from all three versions (book, screenplay and movie).


Option 2

Create a billboard promoting your chosen story. Include information about both the book and movie, about the writer and actors. Work to include story elements and visually represent them in an appealing and clear way. Your goal is to convince students to give the story a try!

Option 4

Create your own trailer video for this book. (Canva and iMovie will work well for this!). Work to include as many story elements as possible and also film effects like music. Study other examples to give you ideas! Keep the target audience and what will appea to them, in mind!

No matter what option you choose, have fun showcasing what you have learned!
















RATEFUL
