The Plagues

1. Nile turned into blood. The Nile was sacred to the Egyptians. They depicted the Nile as Hapi, a fat man with the breasts of a woman which indicated the powers of fertility and nourishment.
2. Frogs. They represented Heka, a frog-headed goddess of fertility and rebirth.
3. Gnats. Represents the earth god, Geb. This god was closely related to the earth in all of its states.
4. Flies. They were most likely the sacred beetle and scarab. These scarabs, many of gold are found in the tombs of Egypt. They were sacred to the sun-god, Ra.
5. Killing of the livestock. Egypt mummified their bulls. Apis, the black bull, was worshipped in Egypt.
6. Boils. The priests who served in the Egyptian temples had to be clean, without any type of break-out or sickness. This brings to a halt all of the false worship in Egypt.
7. Hail. This plague was directed against Isis, goddess of fertility and considered the goddess of the air. The tears of Isis falling into the Nile River caused it to overflow its banks bring nourishment to the land.
8. Locusts. Locusts are used in Scripture as a picture of judgement. It is probably one of the worst things man has to face.

There is a method in the way God is dealing with the Egyptians and the systematic and orderly way in which He is sending the plagues. First plagues were directed against different gods, goddesses, and idols that infested the land. Now God is beginning to direct the plagues in a manner that works a tremendous hardship upon the people and their struggle to stay alive.

9. Darkness. This judgement was upon the sun-god, Ra. Darkness came over the land of Egypt in the daytime. God moved in with darkness against the chief god that they worshipped. The sun disc is the most familiar symbol the Egyptians used; it is in all of their art. This plague showed the utter helplessness of Ra.
10. Death of the firstborn. The firstborn of both man and beast belonged to the gods of Egypt. The Lord God will claim the first fruits of the Egyptian gods.
