- 13. Briefly review when this letter was written and for what purpose.
- 14. The first half of Romans (chapters 1-8) deals primarily with the doctrine of justification. The last eight chapters deal mainly with the doctrine of sanctification. What is the difference between these two doctrines?
- 15. Why and how did the Jews think they were saved?
- 16. Romans 12:9-21 is a beautiful section on sanctification. List the things Paul prays for in this section.
- 17. Read Romans 12:21. How does good overcome evil?
- 18. Read Romans 11:25 and 26. Does this section mean all Jews will ultimately be saved?
- 19. Read Romans 14 verses 1 and 20. What disputable matters was Paul referring to? What could those disputable matters or debatable issues be today?
- 20. Read Romans 12:20. In this verse, Paule quotes from Proverbs 25. These verses are a good example of how to overcome evil with good. What is the meaning of the image of heaping "burning coals" on someone's head?
- 21. Read Romans 3:14. Is the death penalty a mistake? How about being a soldier or killing someone in self-defense?
- 22. Read Romans 16:17. What does it mean that we should stay away from people teaching contrary to the Bible?
