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Why Advent?

It was around 10 years ago that I was introduced to the term advent and its practice. In full disclosure, I am not sure that I truly understood all that it entailed until several years ago. I have always loved Christmas. I have the fondest memories of Christmas as a child, and I have always been drawn to tradition. Burl Ives is still my go-to for Christmas music, and every year I watch "It's A Wonderful Life" at least once.

Twelve years ago, I gave birth to my oldest son just six weeks before Christmas. In the years following his birth, I began searching for a way to incorporate more of Christ and less commercialism into our family traditions. Advent Traditions

There are many traditions found within the Advent celebration. For the purpose of this study, I will explore those that focus on Christ.

- Advent Wreath
 - A circle of evergreen branches is traditionally used for an Advent Wreath. Many families will use candles with this. Traditionally there are three purple candles, a rose/pink colored candle, and a white candle.
 - Each Sunday leading up to Christmas a new candle is lit.
 - Week 1 purple candle. This candle represents Hope and is often referred to as the Prophecy Candle.
 - Week 2 purple candle. This candle is the Bethlehem Candle and represents Peace.
 - Week 3 rose/pink candle. This candle is the Shepherds Candle and represents Joy.
 - Week 4 purple candle. The final weekly candle is referred to as the Angel's Candle and represents Love.
 - Christmas Day white candle. Known as the Christ candle, this candle represents the life of Christ.
- Advent Calendar
 - Many families use a paper calendar and begin counting down the days until Christmas beginning December 1. Each day a scripture or prayer is revealed to focus on. Many people use different pieces of the nativity each day to focus on. The origins of this celebration date back to the 9th century in Germany. Many of these paper box-style calendars can be purchased online or in stores.
- Praying
 - Enjoy this time as a family to pray over the world, local communities, and your family/friends.
- Worship
 - Sing songs that represent the hope, peace, joy, and love of Christ.

Advent Devotional

Whether you choose to partake in Advent activities or not, this devotional was created with the intention of being focused on scriptures during the weeks leading up to Christmas Day. The theme of this devotional includes traditional Christmas hymns. I have created a YouTube playlist that includes the songs in the devotional. CHRISTMAS (from Old English, Christes mæsse; literally, "Christ's mass"). An annual holiday commemorating the birth of Jesus.

Christmas is traditionally celebrated in the West on December 25; this date was likely determined by the mid-tolate fourth century. Some groups, following the older Julian calendar, observe the holiday on December 25 of that calendar, which corresponds to January 7 in the Gregorian calendar.

By the late fourth century, Christmas had started to surface as a holiday in its own right, though in its early stages it was more of a prelude to the more established celebration of Epiphany (Kelly, Origins, 69-71). These holidays remain linked in both Eastern and Western traditions, with the Christmas season still ushering in Epiphany. Beginning in the ninth century, however—possibly as the result of the coronation of Emperor Charlemagne on Christmas Day in 800 A.D.—celebration of Christmas became a more prominent, distinguished, and public affair in the West (Murray, "Medieval," 31-39). Much of what has today become common Christmas imagery (e.g., Santa Claus, Christmas trees) originated in the early modern era, with some traditions emerging as late as the 19th century.

Advent allows followers of Christ the opportunity to reflect on Jesus' first and second coming. It is not simply just a Christmas story. Jesus is woven all throughout scripture from the beginning until the end. During Advent, allow your heart to reflect on the promised Messiah, his fleshly arrival, and the promised Hope of His return. In Him, we find salvation, mercy, grace, hope, peace, joy, and love. We are reconciled to the Father through the atonement of Christ.

If you have not yet asked Jesus to be the Master and Lord of your life, I pray this time in scripture will confirm His desire to offer you the incredible gift of His salvation. While we were dead in our sins, Christ offered us redemption through his life, death on the cross, and resurrection. He is the Way, the Truth, and the Life. O Come, O Come Emmanuel

O come, O come, Emmanuel, And ransom captive Israel, That mourns in lonely exile here, Until the Son of God appear.

Chorus:

Rejoice! Rejoice! Emmanuel Shall come to thee, O Israel. O come, Thou Rod of Jesse, free Thine own from Satan's tyranny; From depths of hell Thy people save, And give them victory o'er the grave.

O come, O Dayspring, come and cheer Our spirits by thine advent here; And drive away the shades of night and pierce the clouds and bring us light.

O come, Thou Key of David, come And open wide our heav'nly home; Make safe the way that leads on high, And close the path to misery.

> O come, O come, Adonai, Who in thy glorious majesty From Sinai's mountain, clothes in awe, Gavest thy folk the elder law.

One of the oldest Christmas carols in circulation, the author of "O Come, O Come Emmanuel" is unknown. Believing to be dated to 800 A.D. and penned by a monk or priest, the author was knowledgeable of scripture, and more than likely a biblical scholar. The original lyrics were written in Latin.

The song was used each year by the Catholic Church during its Advent worship. One verse was recited or sung each day for seven days leading up to Christmas. The song represents a deep understanding of biblical knowledge and was able to be passed down during a time when most homes didn't have a Bible.

The song gained additional popularity when John Mason Neale translated the original Latin into English in the mid-1800s. The verses are representative of Isaiah 7:14 and Matthew 1:23; He shall be called Emmanuel, "God with us". The song references Isaiah 11, Malachi 4:2, and Isaiah 22:22.





Over 2000 years ago, there was great anticipation of the long-awaited Messiah. Spoken about for hundreds of years by the prophets, God's people waited for the Righteous One.

Jeremiah 33:12-16

"Thus says the Lord of hosts: In this place that is waste, without man or beast, and in all of its cities, there shall again be habitations of shepherds resting their flocks. In the cities of the hill country, in the cities of the Shephelah, and in the cities of the Negeb, in the land of Benjamin, the places about Jerusalem, and in the cities of Judah, flocks shall again pass under the hands of the one who counts them, says the Lord.

"Behold, the days are coming, declares the Lord, when I will fulfill the promise I made to the house of Israel and the house of Judah. In those days and at that time I will cause a righteous Branch to spring up for David, and he shall execute justice and righteousness in the land. In those days Judah will be saved, and Jerusalem will dwell securely. And this is the name by which it will be called: 'The Lord is our righteousness.'

"Man is not naturally righteous (Pss. 14:1; 53:1, cp. Rom. 3:10–18). Righteousness is not native to him but to God. In Jesus' teaching the righteousness of the Pharisees is not enough to gain entrance into the kingdom of God (Matt. 5:20; cp. 3:13, 21, 31). Paul argues in Rom. 3 that no man is naturally righteous. Even after conversion, Paul speaks of the struggle to follow the law of righteousness and not the law he finds in his "body of death" (Rom. 7:14–8:1). God credits righteousness to those who exercise faith in Him (Rom. 4:15). In Christ one becomes all that God requires (2 Cor. 5:21; cp. Rom. 4:6, 14). The result of becoming the righteousness of God is a life of righteousness before God. Paul urges believers to continue to offer up the members of their bodies as instruments of righteousness to God (Rom. 6:13). The Christian is urged to put on the breastplate of righteousness (Eph. 6:14). Timothy is exhorted to flee youthful lusts, call on God from a pure heart, and pursue righteousness (2 Tim. 4:8). Those trained through discipline produce the peaceful fruit of righteousness (Heb. 12:9–11)."

Family Focus

The theme of this week is prophecy or the HOPE of Christ. Spend time talking as a family about what it must have been like to wait hundreds of years for the Messiah (technically thousands since the Garden). In the years of silence between the prophecies of the Old Testament and the arrival of Jesus, do you think their hope was waning or strengthened? What would have kept their hope renewed?

lsaiah 2:2-5

It shall come to pass in the latter days that the mountain of the house of the Lord shall be established as the highest of the mountains, and shall be lifted up above the hills; and all the nations shall flow to it, and many peoples shall come, and say: "Come, let us go up to the mountain of the Lord, to the house of the God of Jacob, that he may teach us his ways and that we may walk in his paths." For out of Zion shall go forth the law, and the word of the Lord from Jerusalem. He shall judge between the nations, and shall decide disputes for many peoples; and they shall beat their swords into plowshares, and their spears into pruning hooks; nation shall not lift up sword against nation, neither shall they learn war anymore. O house of Jacob, come, let us walk in the light of the Lord.

Lo, How A Rose E'Er Blooming

Lo, how a Rose e'er blooming From tender stem hath sprung! Of Jesse's lineage coming, As men of old have sung. It came, a flow'ret bright, Amid the cold of winter, When half spent was the night.

Isaiah 'twas foretold it, The Rose I have in mind; With Mary we behold it, The virgin mother kind. To show God's love aright, She bore to men a Savior, When half spent was the night.

This Flow'r, whose fragrance tender With sweetness fills the air, Dispels with glorious splendor The darkness everywhere. True man, yet very God, From sin and death He saves us, And lightens every load. While the author is unknown, this hymn first appeared in a German hymnal in 1599, titled, *Es Ist ein Ros Entsprungen*. The original two stanzas depicted the prophecy in Isaiah 11 that the Messiah would be from the root of Jesse. Composer, Michael Praetorius, added harmonization to the original work 10 years later.

Over the years the hymn has been translated into various languages, and additional stanzas added.

Isaiah 42:1-9 Behold my servant, whom I uphold, my chosen, in whom my soul delights; I have put my Spirit upon him; he will bring forth justice to the nations. He will not cry aloud or lift up his voice, or make it heard in the street; a bruised reed he will not break, and a faintly burning wick he will not quench; he will faithfully bring forth justice. He will not grow faint or be discouraged till he has established justice in the earth; and the coastlands wait for his law. Thus says God, the Lord, who created the heavens and stretched them out, who spread out the earth and what comes from it,

Week 1 - Hope "I am the Lord; I have called you in righteousness; I will take you by the hand and keep you; I will give you as a covenant for the people, a light for the nations, to open the eyes that are blind,

- to bring out the prisoners from the dungeon, from the prison those who sit in darkness. I am the Lord; that is my name; my glory I give to no other, nor my praise to carved idols. Behold, the former things have come to pass, and new things I now declare;
- before they spring forth
- I tell you of them."

Of the increase of his government and of peace there will be no end, on the throne of David and over his kingdom, to establish it and to uphold it with justice and with righteousness from this time forth and forevermore. The zeal of the Lord of hosts will do this.

Joy to the World!

No more let sins and sorrows grow, Nor thorns infest the ground; He comes to make His blessings flow Far as the curse is found, Far as the curse is found, Far as, far as, the curse is found.

He rules the world with truth and grace, And makes the nations prove The glories of His righteousness, And wonders of His love, And wonders of His love, And wonders, wonders, of His love. Although not written as a Christmas carol, the collaboration of "Joy to the World" by Isaac Watts and Lowell Mason has stood the test of time in Christmas worship.

Neither collaborator knew the other and were separated by over 100 years! In 1674 Isaac Watts was born in Southampton, England, and although greatly rejected desired a revolution in the traditional worship hymns. He felt many of them were monotonous and lacked passion. Throughout his ministry as a pastor, he wrote poems, rewrote psalms, and penned hymns. Many of which were rejected by the church at that time. Yet he believed in more than the status quo and challenged the musical scene.

Born in New Jersey in the early 1800s, Lowell Mason also struggled with the musical offerings by the local churches. As a student of the composer Handel, Mason attempted to have his music and arrangements published. Years later he discovered his initially rejected pieces were indeed published and being ordered by the thousands.

In 1836 Mason wrote the musical composition "Antioch". It would be several years later that he discovered the lyrics of "Joy to the World!" by Watts and paired the two together.



Isaiah 52:7-10 How beautiful upon the mountains are the feet of him who brings good news, who publishes peace, who brings good news of happiness, who publishes salvation, who says to Zion, "Your God reigns." The voice of your watchmen-they lift up their voice; together they sing for joy; for eye to eye they see the return of the Lord to Zion. Break forth together into singing, you waste places of Jerusalem, for the Lord has comforted his people; he has redeemed Jerusalem. The Lord has bared his holy arm before the eyes of all the nations, and all the ends of the earth shall see the salvation of our God.

Isaiah 61 The Spirit of the Lord God is upon me, because the Lord has anointed me to bring good news to the poor; he has sent me to bind up the brokenhearted, to proclaim liberty to the captives, and the opening of the prison to those who are bound; to proclaim the year of the Lord's favor, and the day of vengeance of our God; to comfort all who mourn: to grant to those who mourn in Zionto give them a beautiful headdress instead of ashes, the oil of gladness instead of mourning, the garment of praise instead of a faint spirit; that they may be called oaks of righteousness, the planting of the Lord, that he may be glorified. They shall build up the ancient ruins; they shall raise up the former devastations; they shall repair the ruined cities, the devastations of many generations. Strangers shall stand and tend your flocks; foreigners shall be your plowmen and vinedressers; but you shall be called the priests of the Lord; they shall speak of you as the ministers of our God;

you shall eat the wealth of the nations, and in their glory you shall boast. Instead of your shame there shall be a double portion; instead of dishonor they shall rejoice in their lot; therefore in their land they shall possess a double portion; they shall have everlasting joy. For I the Lord love justice; I hate robbery and wrong; I will faithfully give them their recompense, and I will make an everlasting covenant with them. Their offspring shall be known among the nations, and their descendants in the midst of the peoples; all who see them shall acknowledge them, that they are an offspring the Lord has blessed. I will greatly rejoice in the Lord; my soul shall exult in my God, for he has clothed me with the garments of salvation; he has covered me with the robe of righteousness, as a bridegroom decks himself like a priest with a beautiful headdress, and as a bride adorns herself with her jewels. For as the earth brings forth its sprouts, and as a garden causes what is sown in it to sprout up, so the Lord God will cause righteousness and praise

to sprout up before all the nations.

Family Focus

The theme of this week is PEACE. Israel was a nation that experienced much turmoil as a result of disobeying God. When the prophets began to speak of the Messiah, he would offer peace in Him. As a family discuss what the peace of Christ looks like for each person. How is it different from wordly peace?

John 14: 23-27

Roman Catholic priest, John Francis Wade, composed "Adeste Fideles". The original hymn was written in Latin, and published in his book, Cantus Diversi, in 1751. Wade fled from England to Douay, France in 1745 to escape religious persecution. While in France he researched and recorded historical church music. As he discovered interesting music, he would copy and distribute it to churches around the area. Wade preserved many of the sacred hymns that might have been lost. During this time, Wade also penned many of this own songs. One of those was "Adeste Fideles"; published in his book, "Cantus Diversi" in 1751.

The hymn was later translated from Latin to English by Frederick Oakley. Oakley translated the lyrics for his congregation, the Margaret Street Chapel in London.

"Oh Come, All Ye Faithful" has been translated into more than 100 different languages and referred to as one of the "greatest carols ever written."

Even before he made the world, God loved us and chose us in Christ to be holy and without fault in his eyes. God decided in advance to adopt us into his own family by bringing us to himself through Jesus Christ. This is what he wanted to do, and it gave him great pleasure. So we praise God for the glorious grace he has poured out on us who belong to his dear Son. He is so rich in kindness and grace that he purchased our freedom with the blood of his Son and forgave our sins. He has showered his kindness on us, along with all wisdom and understanding.

God has now revealed to us his mysterious will regarding Christ—which is to fulfill his own good plan. And this is the plan: At the right time he will bring everything together under the authority of Christ—everything in heaven and on earth. Furthermore, because we are united with Christ, we have received an inheritance from God, for he chose us in advance, and he makes everything work out according to his plan.

Silent Night

In 1817 Joseph Mohr was the assistant priest at St. Nicholas in Oberndof, Austria. As he was prepping for the Christmas Eve Midnight Mass, Mohr discovered the church's organ would not play. He had spent months preparing for the midnight worship service and without a functioning organ, he wasn't sure how the service would be held.

Mohr spent hours attempting to fix the organ without success. He prayed for God to help him find a way to bring music to the service. He remembered a poem that he had written several years earlier. He pulled out the six stanzas he had penned and knew the Lord was guiding him.

Mohr raced across town to ask his friend and church musician, Franz Gruber, if he could write a melody to the poem. Knowing they would only be able to use a guitar, Gruber accepted the challenge. Hours before the midnight service, Mohr and Gruber taught the simple song to the choir.

A month later, Mohr recounted the story to Karl Mauracher, an organ repairman. Mauracher was impressed with the song and wrote down lyrics and learned the melody. He began to share it with other churches, and the song began to gain popularity.

Mohr never received recognition for his writing until after his death. Yet his divine inspiration has become one of the most recorded songs in history.

The author of this popular Christmas carol is unknown, as well as the location of its inception. It is believed to have been written during the Middle Ages. The only Bibles in circulation during that time would have been in the local churches, and most of them were written in Latin. With a vast majority of people being illiterate, most Christ-followers were familiar with biblical stories based on hearing them repeated or passed down through the generations.

The song's author was slightly misrepresentative of scripture in a few of the lyrics. Yet, had enough knowledge to know that "noel" meant a "joyful shout expressing the exhilaration at the birth of Christ." The author was excited about the birth of Christ and the celebration or worship thereof.

This song was not part of a religious celebration in its origin. It would have been sung as a holiday celebration through family traditions. The song was published in 1833 by William Sandys. He researched and collected French and English folk songs, and included "The First Noel" in his book. It was already popular with the peasant class and began being used in worship in the Church of England soon after.

Day 16 Week 3 - Joy

His pow'r and glory, evermore proclaim! His pow'r and glory, evermore proclaim! Frenchman, Placide Cappeau, was asked by his parish priest to write a poem for their Christmas pageant. Cappeau found inspiration from the birth story in Luke, while on a business trip on December 3, 1847. Cappeau wrote the poem while traveling to Paris.

Upon completion he asked his composer friend, Adolphe Adam to add music to it. Within a few days, the accomplished composer added music to the poem. Sopranist Emily Laurey performed the hymn, *Noel d'Adam*, at midnight Mass on Christmas Eve 1847. The lyrics and musical composition were written within a month.

During the early years of its inception, *Cantique de Noel* was accepted by the church of France and various Catholic Christmas services. Cappeau eventually walked away from the church to join the socialist movement, and Adams was a Jew. The church renounced the song as unfit for service and worship.

A decade later, in 1855 *Cantique de Noel* was translated into English by a Unitarian Minister from Massachusetts.

On Christmas Eve 1906, Reginald Fessenden broadcast over the airwaves for the first time in history. He began with the reading of the birth story from Luke. Upon completion of the scripture, Fessenden picked up his violin and began playing "O Holy Night. This was the first song ever sent over radio waves.

Luke 1:65-79

And his father Zechariah was filled with the Holy Spirit and prophesied, saying,

"Blessed be the Lord God of Israel, for he has visited and redeemed his people and has raised up a horn of salvation for us in the house of his servant David,

as he spoke by the mouth of his holy prophets from of old, that we should be saved from our enemies and from the hand of all who hate us; to show the mercy promised to our fathers and to remember his holy covenant, the oath that he swore to our father

Abraham, to grant us that we, being delivered from the hand of our enemies, might serve him without fear, in holiness and righteousness before him all our days.

And you, child, will be called the prophet of the Most High; for you will go before the Lord to prepare his ways, to give knowledge of salvation to his people in the forgiveness of their sins, because of the tender mercy of our God, whereby the sunrise shall visit us[h] from on high to give light to those who sit in darkness and in the shadow of death, to guide our feet into the way of peace."

"Glory to God in the highest,

O Little Town of Bethlehem

O little town of Bethlehem, how still we see thee lie! Above thy deep and dreamless sleep the silent stars go by. Yet in thy dark streets shineth the everlasting light; the hopes and fears of all the years are met in thee tonight.

For Christ is born of Mary, and gathered all above, while mortals sleep, the angels keep their watch of wond'ring love. O morning stars, together proclaim the holy birth! And praises sing to God, the King, and peace on earth to men.

How silently, how silently, the wondrous gift is giv'n! So God imparts to human hearts the blessings of his heaven. No ear may hear his coming, but in this world of sin, where meek souls will receive him still the dear Christ enters in.

O holy Child of Bethlehem, descend to us we pray, cast out our sin, and enter in, be born in us today! We hear the Christmas angels the great glad tidings tell. O come to us, abide with us, our Lord Emmanuel. Authored by one of the most influential American pastors of the 19th century, Phillips Brooks. "O Little Town of Bethlehem" was inspired by a much-needed sabbatical for Brooks on December 24, 1865.

Weary from the Civil War and pastoring a deeply saddened congregation during that time, Brooks realized several years after that he was in need of a soulrestoration for himself. After presiding over the burial service for Abraham Lincoln, Brooks ventured away from his home in Philadelphia to the Middle East.

On Christmas Eve, he saddled a horse and snuck away from the crowds and found himself journeying to Bethlehem in the evening. Struck with the awe of knowing Christ had been born in that area, he later reported to his friends and family that it left him with a "singing in my soul". He described the experience as overwhelming.

Years later he found himself having difficulty getting his congregation to understand the impact of his trip. He sat to write about the experience three years later and penned the lyrics of "O Little Town of Bethlehem". He immediately shared it with friend and church musician, Lewis Radner. The organist struggled to provide musical accompaniment to the poem. On December 24, Radner was awakened in the night with what he considered divine inspiration for the music of the writing.

The song was the most popular Christmas song for the church and surrounding Philadelphia congregations for six years. It was published by William Huntington in 1874 and spread throughout as one of the most popular Christmas carols of its time.



Day 22 Week 4 - Love

lsaiah 7:10-17

Again the Lord spoke to Ahaz: "Ask a sign of the Lord your God; let it be deep as Sheol or high as heaven." But Ahaz said, "I will not ask, and I will not put the Lord to the test." And he said, "Hear then, O house of David! Is it too little for you to weary men, that you weary my God also? Therefore the Lord himself will give you a sign. Behold, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and shall call his name *Immanuel*. He shall eat curds and honey when he knows how to refuse the evil and choose the good. For before the boy knows how to refuse the evil and choose the good, the land whose two kings you dread will be deserted. The Lord will bring upon you and upon your people and upon your father's house such days as have not come since the day that Ephraim departed from Judah—the king of Assyria!"

Family Focus

As we enter the final week of Advent, focus on the Love that came down. God in mercy, grace, and love gave us his Son. Immanuel means God with us. As flesh appeared over 2000 years ago, we were given the opportunity for redemption and reconciliation. What does that mean for your family? What does that mean for you?

Week 4 - Love

Matthew 1:18-25

This is how Jesus the Messiah was born. His mother, Mary, was engaged to be married to Joseph. But before the marriage took place, while she was still a virgin, she became pregnant through the power of the Holy Spirit. Joseph, to whom she was engaged, was a righteous man and did not want to disgrace her publicly, so he decided to break the engagement quietly.

As he considered this, an angel of the Lord appeared to him in a dream. "Joseph, son of David," the angel said, "do not be afraid to take Mary as your wife. For the child within her was conceived by the Holy Spirit. And she will have a son, and you are to name him Jesus, for he will save his people from their sins."

All of this occurred to fulfill the Lord's message through his prophet:

"Look! The virgin will conceive a child!

She will give birth to a son,

and they will call him Immanuel,

which means 'God is with us.'"

When Joseph woke up, he did as the angel of the Lord commanded and took Mary as his wife. But he did not have sexual relations with her until her son was born. And Joseph named him Jesus.

And you are included among those Gentiles who have been called to belong to Jesus Christ. I am writing to all of you in Rome who are loved by God and are called to be his own holy people.

Angels We Have Heard On High

Angels we have heard on high Sweetly singing o'er the plains And the mountains in reply Echoing their joyous strains

> Chorus: Gloria in excelsis Deo! Gloria in excelsis Deo!

Shepherds, why this jubilee? Why your joyous strains prolong? Say what may the tidings be, Which inspire your heavenly songs?

Come to Bethlehem and see Him whose birth the angels sing; Come, adore on bended knee, Christ the Lord, the newborn King.

See within a manager laid, Jesus, Lord of heav'n and earth! Mary, Joseph, lend your aid, With us sing our Savior's birth. The author and date of this Christmas hymn are a mystery. Although many claim it as a traditional French hymn, there are clues that suggest it may be one of the oldest hymns ever recorded.

The chorus "Gloria in Excelsis Deo!" means "Glory to God in the highest". This Latin phrase dates back to the first century. Pope Telesphorus issued a decree around 130 A.D. that all churches would have a special Christmas service. The phrase "Gloria in Excelsis Deo!" was sung during the service and carried on through the third century.

The lyrics of "Angels We Have Heard On High" suggest a biblical scholar or monk would have inspired the poem or song. It depicts the sweet arrival of angels to shepherds nearby, representing that Christ had come for everyone.

Kenneth W. Osbeck once wrote, "The Bible teaches that angels are the ministering servants of God and that they are continually being sent to help and protect us, the heirs of salvation."



Day 25 Week 4 - Love

Luke 21:25-36

"And there will be signs in sun and moon and stars, and on the earth distress of nations in perplexity because of the roaring of the sea and the waves, people fainting with fear and with foreboding of what is coming on the world. For the powers of the heavens will be shaken. And then they will see the Son of Man coming in a cloud with power and great glory. Now when these things begin to take place, straighten up and raise your heads, because your redemption is drawing near."

How Great Our Joy

While by my sheep, I watched at night Glad tiding brought an angel bright

Close shall I guard this darling Boy, Thus shall my heart be filled with joy. Although the author and date are unknown, there is the belief that the song has a German origin. It may date back to as early as the 1500's, and was modernized and given an echo section in 1623.

The song is rumored to have been created for a Christmas play. The shepherd's lines would have been echoed off stage.

The original poem contains nine stanzas however, only stanzas two through four are sung in traditional American choirs. The song is inspired by Micah 5:2 and Luke 2:8-20.

Historians have traced its origins to the 4th Century, recorded as a motet or epiphany. Written without musical accompaniment by St. Hilary of Poitiers between 310 – 367.

A motet is a short, sacred vocal composition. St. Hilary imagined what it would have been like for the Magi to arrive and meet Jesus after their long journey.
