### MILKWEED

Monarch butterflies lay their eggs on milkweed plants. This plant is very important to the survival of the caterpillar because the milky white sap makes the caterpillar poisonous to birds. Birds may eat one monarch caterpillar and feel bad afterward. They remember to avoid them in the future.

Often, you can know if caterpillars are poisonous because they are brightly colored, or they have a fuzzy or bristle-like hairs covering their body. This is often but not always the case.

Monarch caterpillars blend in very well with the plants, making it difficult to find them. Every day I go outside and search for the caterpillar, hoping a bird didn't decide to eat it. So far, every day I have found the growing caterpillar. I hope to watch it turn into a chrysalis and then a butterfly. Monarchs that hatch late in the summer are the ones that will fly to Mexico to overwinter. I would love to say that one of mine was able to take that long journey south.
