In Rainforest, we talked about rodents and how important they are to the rainforest ecosystem. We learned about how they help distribute seeds and how their nest building is helpful not only for the safety of themselves and their babies, but also for other animals who will move in after they are gone. We even built our own nests out of mostly recycled materials, to practice being creative with the supplies that are available like the rodents do.

For homework:

The students should draw or write about one rainforest rodent and how it helps the rainforest. They could show it building a nest, storing a seed, or changing the forest in some way. Be sure to explain how its actions make a difference for other plants and animals.

In our Magic School Bus class, students watched the episode Makes a Rainbow, where Ms. Frizzle and her class explored how white light separates into different colors to create a rainbow. Afterward, we put that learning into action with a hands-on light and color experiment! Students colored each section of a circle pie chart in different shades, made predictions about which colors they would see the most after spinning it, and observed how brightness affected what appeared. For homework, they were encouraged to test their color wheels at home and record which colors "popped" the most. It was a fun and creative way to explore how light and color work together in our everyday world!

This week in Little Builders, we read "Look at that Building" and then discussed how many buildings feature patterns. For our project, we used shapes and glued them in patterns to create a wall or tower.

Taking dried plants, such as peppermint, plantain, sage, and even chamomile, students chose their plants and stuffed the leaves into a jar, which then topped off with a carrier oil - either sunflower oil or olive oil. These jars need to sit around for 4-6 weeks to make them potent. Later, we will use these to make our own salves. Excellent work today!

To IEW Investigations in Writing Taught by Leah Boone

6th-8th

Investigations in Writing: Lesson 8 - Theseus and the Minotaur. We are still using the Story Sequence to tell narrative stories. We reviewed our style elements: -ly adverbs, who/which clauses, and strong verbs. I handed out some lists of strong verbs to use in place of "weak" ones. Students are to avoid these weak verbs: see/saw, thing/thought, go/went, and say/said. We didn't spend much time on the new "dress-up," which is a because clause, so if your student doesn't quite understand how to use them, we will practice more in class in coming weeks. We read through the source text and started the KWO.

**Some of the creative writers in the class are doing the Story Variation option. We ended class with vocabulary Family Feud!

Homework: Complete the KWO by asking yourself the questions in the boxes, pg 69.

Complete the style practice pages 70-71 (vocab practice pg is optional). Rewrite the story in your own words using your KWO. Edit and add the "dress-ups" listed in the checklist. Even for those doing the story variation, organize your sentences in to three paragraphs that highlight the story sequence.


Research Papers: After doing an inventory check of binders, note cards, and assigned exercises, we a ready to start outlining/organizing our research. At the end of Lesson 7 is a worksheet to begin thinking about what exactly they plan to include in their research paper. The worksheet begins with Introduction, but I've instructed them to skip that section and begin with the body paragraph outlining. IEW practice is to always write your introduction last, so we will brainstorm how to compose a hook, background information, and enumeration of points at a later time.

Homework: Get out your cards and separate into piles - benefit or detriment. Then, using the worksheet on page 83 start thinking/writing out your claims and evidence. (Landon and Ajax still need to finish fleshing out their note cards before starting this new assignment.) Before beginning, decide which side of the argument you *mostly fall on: remember the prompt, "is social media good for society." Once you make this decision, start with the opposing argument (counterargument) and then move on to claims and evidence for the argument you support. Following the counterargument, worksheet provides space for up to 5 claims/evidence, each student must have at least three.


