Control Lifestyle & Priorities

- Do I want a walkable, amenity-rich neighborhood or more space and privacy?
- Is proximity to the freeway/public transit important to my commute/travel habits?
- Am I drawn to a newer, planned community? Or do I prefer established neighborhoods with mature trees and more character?
- Do I value larger lot sizes? Or am I comfortable with a smaller footprint in exchange for lower maintenance or access to shared amenities?
- Would I enjoy being part of a neighborhood HOA with included services and community events?

Family & Community

- What kind of school options do I want for my kids (public, charter, proximity, ratings)?
- How important is being near parks, trails, or family activities?
- Do I want to live in a place that hosts city events like parades, concerts, or farmers markets?
- What kind of community involvement am I looking for (volunteering, sports, arts, local business)?

O Work & Lifestyle

- What's my current commute, and would moving shorten or lengthen it?
- Am I planning to work from home, and if so, what kind of space do I need?
- Do I need access to coworking spaces, coffee shops, or fitness studios?

Reflect & Write

What does "home" mean to you right now?
What kind of environment helps you feel grounded, connected, and supported in this season of life?
Describe a typical weekend in your ideal neighborhood. Are you out on the trails? Meeting friends at the park? Hosting neighbors for dinner? What do you want life to feel like?







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
