Swallowtail Butterfly

Widely spread throughout the world. Around 25 species in North America. They snack on leaves as caterpillars, then drink sweet nectar from flowers when they are adult butterflies.

FUN FACTS

There are over 550 species of swallowtail butterflies. God was very creative in making all these different kinds! Think of all the colors and patterns He came up with.



HAVE YOU EVER NOTICED HOW COLORFUL INSECTS ARE?

A few days ago, we found two swallowtail caterpillars in our yard. One was bright green (pictured to the bottom left), and the other was bright orange. They were about the same size and shape, and both had "false eyes" to trick predators into thinking they were looking at them. These caterpillars were similar and will both become swallowtail butterflies but were very different colors! God was very creative when He made everything in nature. You have probably seen a swallowtail butterfly, even if you did not know what it was. They are very common, and there are over 550 different species. They get their name because of the two points on their hindwings that look similar to a type of bird God made called the swallow. Notice the similar points.
