Zoom out and I know you'll see that you're building something remarkable—one piece at a time.






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

What's It About?

She has been awarded fellowships from The University of Oxford in England and The Rockefeller Foundation's Bellagio Center in Italy, The New York Times Book Review declared, 'Ruta Sepetys acts as champion of the interstitial people so often ignored whole populations lost in the cracks of



history. She is deeply grateful for her Baltic heritage— even if it means she has a name that no one can pronounce. Ruta lives with her family in the hills of Tennessee.

ADDITIONAL INFORMATION/IDEAS

2.In my classes we keep our teams the same for an entire quarter. We have a "leader board" where we keep a running score for all of our brain break games. This is great for team building or creating comradery in a classroom learning environment.:)

3. You can assign this to individuals (ie: in Google Classroom) to do on their own, or complete the challenge as a whole class activity using a screen and projector.

4. This activity can work well in person or via distanced learning.

5.Because the videos are on YouTube, this is an activity that students can easily try/repeat at home with family members. :)

6.Consider letting a classroom helper or leader be the "game show host" and call on classmates to share their ideas and reveal the answers.





HANUKKAH- A HISTORY

A HISTORY OF HANUKKAH

Hanukkah is an eight-day Jewish holiday also known as the Festival of Lights. It celebrates the rededication of an important religious building, the Second Temple which is located in Jerusalem. The original event happened over 2,000 years ago, but Jewish people continue to celebrate this important moment still today. This event occurred after a small group of Jewish soldiers, called the Maccabees, successfully rebelled against the Greek-Syrian army.

One of the most famous stories associated with Hanukkah is the miracle of the oil. When the Maccabees reclaimed the Temple, they found only enough oil to light the menorah, a special candle holder for only one day. Miraculously, the oil lasted for eight days! This miracle is why Hanukkah lasts eight nights and is symbolized by lighting the menorah.

HOW IS HANUKKAH CELEBRATED?

Each night of Hanukkah, one additional candle is lit on the menorah using a special helper candle called the Shamash. Menorahs can be made from various materials, ranging from expensive metals to creative versions crafted by children. Some families use candles, while others light menorahs with olive oil, honoring the original story. Another Hanukkah tradition is playing with a toy called a dreidel. The letters on the spinning top toy stand for "A great miracle happened there," a nod to the miraculous oil.

While Hanukkah is a joyous holiday, it is not the most important Jewish holiday; it is considered minor compared to others like Yom Kippur or Passover. However, its timing near Christmas has influenced some modern traditions, such as giving gifts on all eight nights. Historically, children were given gelt—small amounts of money—but today, gifts often range from toys to larger presents. Traditional foods like potato pancakes, called latkes, and jelly doughnuts, known as sufganiyot, are fried in oil to commemorate the miracle.

Celebrated at sunset, Hanukkah is a time for family, reflection, and fun. From spinning dreidels to enjoying festive foods, this holiday brings light and joy to the dark winter nights. With its rich history and vibrant traditions, Hanukkah reminds us of the power of faith, perseverance, and the miracles that shine through in challenging times.

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How do we get better at any skill? We practice. If you want to be a better free-throw shooter, you get on the line and shoot free throws. If you want to be a faster swimmer, you get in the pool. The same is true for writing. The more we do it, the better we get.

In my classroom, this looks like ten minutes of writing every day. We start at five minutes a day the first week and build up, adding a minute a week, until we reach ten. The prompts in this resource will help you make that practice fun and engaging and also purposeful. The prompts will cover a variety of high interest topics, purposes and forms including fiction, nonfiction, and reflections, with an emphasis on building stamina, idea generation, and enjoyment. When applicable, I call out the genre focus and/or specific skill being practiced. Also, below you can see a list of Common Core State Standards (CCSS) that are routinely addressed and covered by doing these daily writing prompts.

Writing CCSS: W 6-8.2, W 6-8.3, W 6-8.4, W 6-8.5, W 6-8.9, W 6-8.10

If you want, keep these "curriculum and standard" pieces of information to yourself, go for it! There is no need to let the kids know we have a secret plan to trick them into being better writers and hating it a little bit less each day!


