



Growth in 2014

A plate. A cup. A spoon.

So what did you wish for last year? These three simple items were the first things that came to mind when our staff asked a young person what she needed. Teens Alone counselors and case workers help homeless and at-risk youth every day, yet that simple list was especially significant to all of us right before the 2014 holidays. These everyday utensils symbolize Teens Alone services in our area. We provide young people what they need when they need it most. Whether it's counseling, help finding safe housing, food or clean sheets, Teens Alone counselors and case managers respectfully identify and resourcefully address the needs of homeless and at-risk teens to help keep them safe.

A Growing Need

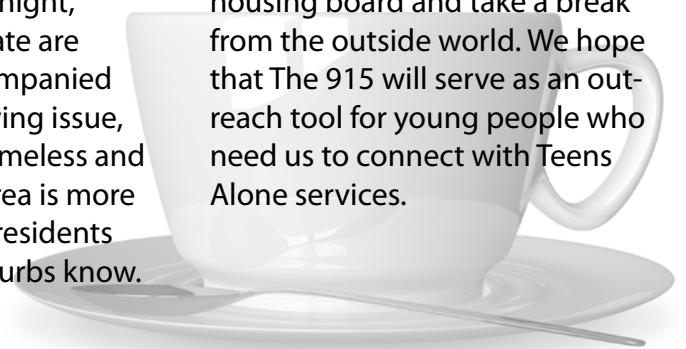
Most days at Teens Alone, our counselors and case managers are faced with problems. A young woman feels unsafe around her mom's boyfriend. A young man got kicked out because he came out. A girl turns 18 and is thrust from the foster care system to fend for herself. Many of their challenges are daunting and most young people don't know how to deal with them on their own.

New data shows that one in 30 teens in the United States is homeless. In Minnesota alone, the Wilder Foundation's research estimates that on any night, 4,000 youths in our state are homeless and unaccompanied by an adult. It's a growing issue, and the number of homeless and at-risk youths in our area is more significant than most residents of our prosperous suburbs know.

A Growing Program

Last year marked a year of preparing for new programs at Teens Alone. As we wrapped up our fiscal year in June, we were busy with plans to start construction for the area's first drop-in center, The 915, and seeking funding for our new Transitional Living Program.

The 915 will be located in the Teens Alone offices. Targeted to serve the older end of the spectrum of youth who need us, The 915 will include space for them to connect with counselors and case workers, fix something to eat, check out the jobs and housing board and take a break from the outside world. We hope that The 915 will serve as an outreach tool for young people who need us to connect with Teens Alone services.





We plan to acquire funding for our new Transitional Living Program (TLP) to support ten housing units. TLP will serve youth who are over 18 and work at least 20 hours/week. Our case workers will help these youth find and apply for safe rental housing, then follow up with a wide variety of details to help them succeed, including managing a budget, setting boundaries with friends, housekeeping tips and learning to be a good tenant and neighbor.

In the midst of planning these two new programs, our counselors continue to respond to the needs of our area youth. Teens Alone responds quickly and with care to our area's youths and their families' needs with barrier-free, no-cost counseling services.

A Lot on Our Plate

Teens Alone is committed to serving our community's young people. Our counselors lead groups in our area schools to prevent homelessness, see youth and families to keep them together when possible and counsel every Teens Alone student to stay in school. The new

TLP program serves the needs of 18+ year olds who are forced into a level of independence they're not quite ready to face alone.

We served 334 young people in 2014. Our three counselors traveled among 18 schools and the Teens Alone office to meet with four-five young people per day in addition to leading a variety of after-school groups (chemical health, anxiety and LGBTQ, for example). Our three case managers can help about 50 young people at a given time, most of whom are couch-hopping. We never want to turn a young person away, and with additional funding, we could invest in more staff to serve more at-risk and homeless kids.

We are proud of the work we do and are very grateful for your past support. Your donations have helped sustain our counseling services and will help create new much-needed Teens Alone programs. The Faces of Teens Alone

What do you think might be the common thread that describes the typical young person who benefits from Teens Alone services? It may surprise you to know that the defining theme among our youth receiving counseling is that they are striving to stay in school. Many are high-achieving students who take part in school activities. In most cases, school is a safe haven filled with supportive adults and our young people understand the importance of earning a high school diploma. It is also very common for trusted adults in these students' schools to be the people who refer them to Teens Alone.

In addition to striving to stay in school, many of the youth we

serve work 20-30 hours per week. It's not easy to struggle with adult problems when you're a student in our affluent suburbs. In addition to work and school, these kids may be couch-hopping, sleeping in cars and missing meals, all while trying to "keep up appearances." Teens Alone kids want to stay close to their schools where they feel safe, knowing our staff will do everything we can to support them.

So, how best to describe the faces of Teens Alone? We are reminded on a daily basis that their need is great but, they are working very, very hard to overcome the challenges in their lives. They are students. They are hard workers. They are your neighbors.

Teens Alone Staff

A day in the life of a Teens Alone counselor or case manager is both challenging and fulfilling. Challenging because of the stories they hear and the problems our young people face; fulfilling because they are usually able to help our kids be safe and successful. Our small staff served 334 young people in 2014 with measurable positive outcomes.

One of our case managers recently told us, "it is heavy work...and there aren't enough (external

resources." On the other hand, she said, "what we say and what we do matches up," and Teens Alone is "small enough to be holistic and creative...to create case plans rather than follow a script."

Every day at Teens Alone is very busy and has its own energy. Each of our counselors see four-five kids daily in 18 different schools across four districts. They conduct support groups in schools and also counsel families at the Teens Alone offices throughout the week. Every

young person helped by our case managers presents unique problems to be solved and logistics to be managed. In addition to finding stable housing and helping to navigate job searches and transportation for at-risk kids, they work on outreach and advocate for youth through involvement in public policy meetings.

Above all, youth are valued at Teens Alone. We honor them every day. It's why we're here; it's who we are, and we're proud to help.

Our Programs

As we approach our 25th year of serving suburban teens, young adults and families, Teens Alone continues to provide our time-tested and effective three-pronged approach: prevention, intervention and crisis services are all required to keep our area's students safely housed and help them graduate from high school.

We provide:

- **Free, Confidential Teen and Family Counseling**
We continued to provide barrier-free, no-cost counseling

services, often responding to crisis calls and walk-ins.

- **School and Community Crisis Prevention Groups**
Teens Alone coordinated and facilitated various group sessions in our area schools (e.g. anxiety, chemical health and LGBTQ).
- **Case management**
Our case managers helped young people navigate and manage the daunting world of early independence.

- **Homeless Youth Advocacy**
Most youth served by Teens Alone are ultimately safely housed. Within this group, the majority of teens under 18 end up staying with their families.
- **Community Capacity Building**
Teens Alone continues to provide leadership in recruiting and developing housing options for homeless teens and emerging adults in our service area, including the Suburban Host Home Program.

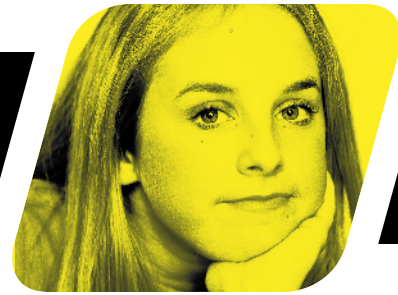
