### Lac La Belle Preserved in Perpetuity

After 6 months of intense Village of Lac La Belle board meetings, Tall Pines has played a crucial role in negotiating the preservation of Saeger Creek wetland complex and the headwaters and ponds that feed it, totaling over 75 acres. The stream feeds directly into Lac La Belle and the streambank is degraded and has been eroding into the lake in recent years. The Village has been on the verge of selling both parts of the property to private parties. As a result, the future of the lake was in question.



Over 80% of the protected property consists of wetlands. Wetlands are critical natural features that provide flood control, clean drinking water, and important wildlife habitat. Since the late 1800s, nearly 50% of Wisconsin wetlands have been lost to development, raising the need to protect these valuable resources.

Saeger Creek, which flows through the protected property and discharges into Lac La Belle, is a significant contributor of nutrients and sediment that negatively impact the lake. Tall Pines Conservancy seeks to collaborate with partners and secure grant funding to restore the degraded creek and improve water quality.

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### **Ride to the Barns Team Profile**

Safety Director Bill Ochowicz

Bill Ochowicz has served as the Ride & Safety Director of Tall Pines Ride to the Barns since 2016. He's also a member of Tall Pines Conservancy Finance Committee and has been an Advisory Board Member since 2019.



An avid cyclist, Bill's passion is a family trait. Both his father and brother raced bikes. Bill's dad Irv was also a race director for a number of high profile races held in Wisconsin and his brother Jim is a well known icon in professional racing having founded the 7-11, Motorola, BMC and CCC teams. Bill raced at an international level in the early 1980's and qualified for the 1984 Olympic Road race trials as well as representing the US in international competitions.

In 2008, Bill and several other passionate Wisconsinites formed the Tour of Americas Dairyland (ToAD) multi-day race series. ToAD, which was presented by Wisconsin Milk Marketing Board upon its inception, and now Kwik Trip, features professionally produced bike races open to multiple categories of participants. Now in its 15th year, it's the largest competitive US bicycle race with 5000 race registrations from athletes representing more than a dozen countries and nearly 30 US states. Bill was ToAD's Race Director until he sold his partnership interest in 2021.

These days Bill directs his cycling passion toward nonprofit organizations and bicycling events, including Tall Pines and the UPAF Ride for the Arts, for which Bill has also served as race director since 2022. His goal is to help these organizations provide a safe and scenic ride experience for participants of all ages and abilities.

Outside of his cycling pursuits, Bill has nearly four decades of health care and commercial real estate experience. He has planned, designed, engineered, negotiated, leased, permitted, and built over two million square feet of medical and allied health office space in numerous buildings and healthcare facilities nationwide.

Ride to the Barns is truly blessed to have such a knowledgeable and experienced cycling professional in charge of route design and safety. Thank you, Bill!



portion of the property is directly adjacent to designated environmental corridors, including the Oconomowoc Lake waterfront.

Development pressures continue to grow in this once very rural stretch of Lake Country, presenting increased concerns about potential adverse impacts to the water quality of both Oconomowoc and Upper Nashotah lakes. The permanent protection of this land helps to address these issues while providing our community with valuable open space for generations into the future.

Another incredible gift was received, from a generous donor, when TPC accepted a conservation easement on a very special 58-acre property located within the Mid-Kettle Moraine in the town of Genesee.



The diverse landscape boasts a unique rolling topography, typical of the Mid-Kettle Moraine, that features forest, wetland, and grassland areas as well as environmental corridor. The property is an ideal choice for

preservation due to its open rural spaces providing scenic enjoyment for future generations, its prime ag designation as well as its high groundwater recharge and storm water infiltration potential.

The anonymous donor was concerned about growing development pressure within the area. As a result, the property was purchased by them in 2020 with the singular intent of preserving it in its natural state. Through their tenacity and your support, this goal was achieved within three short years!



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
