ACADEMIC SUPPORT AND CREATIVE ENRICHMENT PROGRAMS BEGIN



is touching children in the local community through the "It's Lit" literacy program. Epworth and GPC worked together to successfully launch

Academic Support and Creative Enrichment programs to MCPS students. This program includes one-on-one tutoring through the "Let's Read" program that supports 20 struggling readers in 2nd Grade. It also includes the Academic Support and Creative Enrichment programs, which serve 40 students in PK through the 5th Grade. Students have opportunities to build literacy and math skills and participate in creative activities, including Art and Music/Movement.

We are thankful that our churches formed a partnership to fund and staff this program. In addition, both churches have gone beyond that, providing staff and

volunteer support. Nearly 35 staff and volunteers from both churches have stepped out into the literacy mission field as tutors and staff. We are so thankful for this collaboration and the joy produced as our churches work together to make a difference in the lives of children in our community.

THOUGHTS FROM THE RACIAL JUSTICE MINISTRY

Many GPC members have been part of the Let's Read! Tutoring Program in Montgomery Village and then Germantown, and many more are now helping the joint ministry with Epworth UMC this fall. Tutoring children is a fulfilling outreach ministry for our church, an opportunity to give back to our community, and a great way to promote reading and learning. Did you know that it also contributes to racial justice work?

Our Matthew 25 Ministry is focused on dismantling structural racism. One structure that disadvantages minorities is unequal educational opportunities. It's very difficult for a child to succeed, even in a great school system like that of Montgomery County, if reading is a struggle for them. Not all families have the resources to hire a tutor or have the English skills to help their children; some parents are learning English themselves at the same time.

Children "learn to read" by the end of 2nd Grade, and are then expected to "read to learn." By helping them learn to read, and to enjoy reading, we are leveling the playing field now when they are young, which removes more barriers as they go through the educational system.



Madagascar, an island nation renowned for its unique wildlife, lush rainforests, and status as a leading producer of vanilla, is home to a rich tapestry of culture and enduring faith. This story of resilience and hope is told as seen through the eyes of Tony Rasoamiaramanana, a Malagasy, who now shares the spirit of his homeland from the United States.

Amidst Madagascar's breathtaking landscapes, the Malagasy people are guided by a deep Christian faith that shapes their daily lives, strengthens their communities, and inspires perseverance in the face of significant social and economic challenges.

The seeds of Christianity were planted in Madagascar in the early 19th century, brought by British missionaries from the London Missionary Society during the reign of King Radama I (1810-1828). During the reign of Queen Ranavalona I (1828-1861), the church faced severe persecution, as Christian practice was banned and converts were often punished. Despite these

trials, Malagasy Christians persevered, embodying the promise of Romans 8:37: "In all these things we are more than conquerors through Him who loved us."

Faith Today: A Christian Nation at Heart

Christianity remains a foundation of Malagasy life. According to the Pew Research Center (2020), about 85% of Malagasy identify as Christian, while the remainder practice Islam or traditional beliefs. Many Malagasy hold the conviction that faith guides moral choices; a person who acts wrongly might be asked, "Miverena amin'Andriamanitra" - "Return to God" - reflecting a communal reliance on repentance and guidance through Christ.

Among the largest denominations is the FJKM (Fiangonan'i Jesoa Kristy eto Madagasikara) – the Church of Jesus Christ in Madagascar - which closely mirrors Presbyterian traditions. FJKM combines Reformed theology with strong community engagement, worship, and service. Its schools, hospitals, and development programs reach even the most remote regions, living out James 2:17: "Faith by itself, if it is not accompanied by action, is dead."

Other denominations, including the Roman Catholic Church and the Lutheran Church of Madagascar, continue to provide education, social services, and environmental programs demonstrating faith in action across the country.

Challenges and Hope for the Future

Despite its spiritual strength, Madagascar remains one of the poorest nations in the world. The United Nations (2022) reports that over 70% of Malagasy live below the poverty line, earning less than \$1.90 per day. Many communities struggle with unreliable electricity and water, fragile healthcare, limited access to education, widespread corruption, and environmental degradation. In urban areas, begging and informal work remain common as families cope with these hardships. Political uncertainty and ongoing governance challenges continue to affect the nation, complicating efforts to address poverty, infrastructure gaps, and social needs. Yet, faith remains a strong anchor. Malagasy Christians draw strength from Philippians 4:13: "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me."

As Madagascar welcomes a new political head and upcoming government, there is hope that citizens will remain steadfast in faith, becoming mirrors of God's light and demonstrating unity, compassion, and integrity. Faith not only sustains communities but also has the power to transform the nation, turning challenges into opportunities for renewal, justice, and peace.

A Reflection from Afar

Now living in United States, Tony reflects on the faith he witnessed growing up in Madagascar - a faith that thrives amid hardship and radiates joy even in the darkest

times. He finds encouragement in Matthew 5:14: "You are the light of the world. A city set on a hill cannot be hidden."

Madagascar, with all its struggles and natural beauty, continues to shine that light. As the people of Gaithersburg Presbyterian Church extend prayers and support across the globe, they walk together with Malagasy Christians — united by the same Spirit, strengthened by the same hope, and called to the same mission of love.

Originally from Madagascar, Tony Rasoamiaramanana grew up in Antananarivo and Mahajanga before moving to the U.S. in 2011. He works in Governance, Risk, and Compliance (GRC) and is inspired daily by his wife, their two children, and his mother-in-law.

A passionate musician, Tony plays piano and quitar, performing across the DMV and serving with Malagasy musicians in Fiangonana Malagasy Kristianina eto DC (FMK-DC), a DC-based Malagasy ecumenical congregation. If you've never been to a Waffle House, I highly recommend it. The food comes quickly, the coffee is always fresh, and the atmosphere is one of simple hospitality. These restaurants dot the interstate highways throughout the Southeast.

Pastor and professor Fred Craddock once shared a memorable experience at a Waffle House. After finishing one of their famous BLT sandwiches, he ordered a cup of coffee and asked the waitress for two creamers. She pulled out six and laid them on the table. Craddock told her he only needed two, but she smiled and said, "Better to have and not need, than to need and not have." It is an old adage that I have probably said many times myself and heard from many others. It seems like simple wisdom to apply to all parts of our lives.

Craddock, being the thoughtful person he was, handed the extra creamers back and replied, "Best of all is to take what you need and give the rest away." That simple exchange holds a powerful truth, especially as we enter the Christmas season.

Soon we'll be surrounded by advertisements for the latest gadgets, toys, and phones. My daughter has already started circling items that she wants in the

holiday catalogs, and even I've hinted to my wife about a few things I wouldn't mind receiving. But as fun as those things may be, they can't bring lasting fulfillment. What we truly need is spiritual satisfaction.

Jesus reminds us in Matthew 6:19–21: "Do not store up for yourselves treasures on earth, where moths and vermin destroy, and where thieves break in and steal. But store up for yourselves treasures in heaven, where moths and vermin do not destroy, and where thieves do not break in and steal. For where your treasure is, there your heart will be also."

So, where is your heart this Christmas season? What do you truly want? If your spirit feels weary, try giving. One of my former pastors used to say, "Don't give until it hurts-give until it feels good!" You might be surprised how much joy flows from simple generosity. While every commercial this time of year urges us to take and accumulate, Pastor Craddock's words point us in a different direction. Take what you need and give the rest away.

a message from creation care — REDUCING OUR USE OF AND DEPENDENCE ON PLASTIC

We may be diligent in our recycling efforts, but it isn't enough. In 2021, approximately 85% of plastic waste went to landfills and 10% was incinerated, while the recycling rate was between 5% and 6%. The plastic that ends up in landfills or as litter breaks down into microplastics and nanoplastics that pollute waterways, soils, and even the deep sea, making its way up the food chain back to people.

The problem is great, but we CAN make a difference! Based on a New York Times article, here are SIX things that you can do right away:

- Start by buying less and, when possible, avoid buying clothing made from polyester, which is spun from plastic (and sheds microplastics). Most of this low-quality clothing ends up in our landfills.
- Using reusable bags, bottles, and other items, such as reusable straws, soda makers, snack and produce bags, and travel tumblers and travel mugs, can help reduce plastic waste, but only if they are used often and for as long as possible.
- If you shop online, grouping purchases into fewer deliveries and cartons reduces your environmental impact overall by cutting back on the plastic-derived packaging and fillings.

- · Cook at home. Cooking from scratch can reduce the single-use plastics that you acquire from ordering delivered meals or buying prepared foods from the store. Many of these containers are not even recyclable.
- Try using solid or powdered versions of liquid products. There are many options to replace your shampoo & conditioner bottles and laundry & dishwasher detergents. These are often available in plastic-free containers as well.
- Make your own coffee at home. This can save you money and reduce waste. Although paper cups might appear to be recyclable, they actually have plastic linings that keep them from leaking.


