# ORDER OF **1** VENDORS

The order in which you hire your vendors is dependent upon what you find the most important to you. Is getting married at the courtyard overlooking the lake your dream? Then start with your venue and find the date that it is available. Have your heart set on a particular photographer saving your precious memories? Pick a date that they are available and find a venue with the same availability. Make a list of importance to you and start from the top so that you can ensure that your favorite vendors are available to help make your day as magical as possible. Popular vendors to top the list are: venue, photographer, planner, baker, florist, and caterer. Other vendors include rental companies, DJs, hair and makeup artists, videographers, officiants, bands, lighting and more. Cake shops and florists are more likely to be able to handle multiple weddings per day so their availability is more lenient than other vendors, however they do only accept so many weddings per weekend so don't put off booking for too long!
