





STUDY THE IMAGES OF DESIGNER ALLISON WILLSON'S COTTAGE CAREFULLY and you might be able to guess at her favourite decorating source. It's not a top-drawer fabric and wallpaper house or an out-of-the-way antiques barn, though those did factor into the design of the lovely Kawartha Lakes, Ont., retreat she shares with her husband, Tony, and their five-year-old son, Oliver. Her design secret weapon is, in fact, found at the side of the road. "I drive around with snippers in my hand cutting down greenery to bring home," Allison explains. "The pops of colour in our cottage are from Mother Nature."

But nature's influence here goes well beyond vases full of Queen Anne's lace and dramatic aspen branches. Allison designed the inviting spaces as a quiet counterpoint to the cottage's views. "I wanted the rooms to feel relaxed and natural, and that, in large part, is due to our surroundings - the cedars, the birches, the water," she





says. There are also the warm pine elements that are so integral to the home's interior architecture. "The pine wouldn't have been my first choice, but it does allow me to decorate with the cooler colours that I'm drawn to," she says.

Allison didn't so much design the interior here as embark on a four-year journey to make the cottage the family's own. It wasn't a process she felt they should rush. "When we're at the cottage, we simply want to enjoy it, so although I loved the process, I really wanted to take my time with it," she says. "Plus, I wanted the space to evolve organically with how we live."

While the 15-year-old cottage was roomy and structurally sound, it had been built from a prefab kit and lacked the character, those rustic storytelling details, found in cottages that are lovingly tinkered with for generations. "It really needed layers to give it a bit of

soul," says Allison. "So we added textures like grasscloth, sisal rugs and shiplap, and freshened things up with paint and wallpaper." Allison admits she had a lot of fun finding furniture to fill out the warm informal rooms. "I couldn't drive by an antiques barn without swinging in to see what I could find," she recalls. "All the items I bought offer some sort of interest, whether they're patinated or weathered or woven."

Secondhand pieces suit cottage life to a T. "There isn't anything too precious to sit on. We're constantly coming in with wet bathing suits and towels. We love to have visitors at the cottage, and everything's very casual. Guests bring their dogs. Oliver's a kid - he's not concerned about clean feet. Antiques that have a bit of wear and tear or patina on them reflect real life."

In a refreshing admission from a designer known for creating chic impeccable spaces, Allison says she →

thinks cottages are more interesting when they aren't flawless. "A cottage provides a wonderful opportunity to relax yourself. The scales don't have to be perfect, and things don't have to match perfectly."

That said, this cottage feels just right to Allison and Tony. "This was the first home we bought together, and it took time to figure out what we both liked years, really, but now it feels so much like us. Nothing was rushed or compromised. Everything was found and purchased out of love, if that makes sense. And maybe in the end nothing matches, but that's what makes it perfect in my mind."
