


"THE PRODIGAL SON"

- 1. Read the Parable of the Prodigal Son in its entirety, Luke 15: 11-32. Break down the different characters. Who does the father, the younger prodigal son and the elder/firstborn son represent in real life?
- 2. Re-read verses 20-24. The father sees the son in the distance, has compassion for him and runs to meet the son. Then the father restores the son to his rightful place in the family.
 - What is the message Jesus is trying to communicate with those listening?
 - Why is the restoration, (the rose and ring), so significant?
 - How does it make you feel that the father celebrates that which is lost?
- 3. The second half of the parable is directed at the Pharisees and the condition of their heart. Read verses 25-32 and look for the similarities between the eldest son in the story and the Pharisees in real life.

[LEAD (YOURSELF)]

Sometime this week, ask yourself these questions.

Who do you relate to the most in the parable of the Prodigal Son. Have you, like the older son, slipped into a life of works to earn God's favor? What lesson can you learn from Jesus' teaching and apply to your walk today?
