All Ages

In Architecture, students finalized their streetscapes using two-point perspective, bringing depth and realism to their designs.

1st - 3rd

This week in Logic Lab, we read *Library Mouse*, a story about research, curiosity, and creativity. Afterward, students went to their other activity stations—one group played the penguin-themed memory game Pengaloo to strengthen observation and recall skills, while the other group worked on mazes and even designed their own!

M: Little Builders

Taught by Shannon Van Beek

1st - 3rd

This week in little builders, we read "The World is not a Rectangle" and then used blocks to build buildings in any shapes we wanted to.

All Ages

1st -12th.

Some of your students became structural engineers. We went over basic structures for bridges, designs and the science behind how bridges work.

Your students were given materials (popsicle sticks and glue) to design a structure that could with stand a moderate amount of weight.

The older class came up with some structurally sound designs. I will be bringing in heavier weights next class to really give these builds a true test of strength.

4th -12th

We covered the very basics of a hydraulic system. We learned where these things are used in our world around us.

Your students were given instructions on how to build a hydraulic elevator and then they got to work. It was so amazing to see these kids pick up on thos concept pretty quickly.

All Ages

The 1st - 3rd grade class finished making art with code and began learning how to code loops (iteration) with Rey and BB-8!

The 4th - 6th grade class continued working on nested loops, and then they began creating complex snowflake shapes using loops.

The 7th - 12th grade class finished all of their challenges in the first course today by using Until loops (more conditional logic)! We then began creating a final project for this module. Students could choose from creating a basketball game, a Star Wars game, a dance party with animation, or an art animation using code. Some students finished, but we'll have some class time to finish for those who still need more time.

4th - 6th / 7th - 12th

In our 7th–12th grade design class, students celebrated a milestone as our mug design was officially approved for print! The class is now continuing to work on our fox project, where they are learning new techniques in Adobe Illustrator and putting their creativity to the test.

Meanwhile, our 4th–6th graders joined Mrs. Robbi's Handcrafts class, and the students were fantastic helpers, eagerly assisting and exploring new projects while I had to step out early due to unforeseen circumstances.

They decorated them, wood burned designs on them and had to use wrenches to put on the nuts and bolts. Those who finished were very proud of the final result. It was a fun and busy day!

All Ages

Today in cooking science we decorated and packaged up our hot chocolate bombs. We ended up with 56 to sell at the movers and makers event. A big thank you to all the kids for their hard work to make this happen!

We some extra time so the younger kids got to be paleontologists. I had frozen water and baking soda in rubber gloves and they used vinegar then some hot water to uncover tiny sea creatures and gems. They had a bunch of fun with this!!!

The older kids finished up the decorating and packing then got a treat of apples and a caramel whip dip.

Recipe for the caramel whip dip:

1 1/2 cups heavy whipping cream

1/2 teaspoon cinnamon

1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract

1/3 cup powdered sugar

1/2 cup caramel sauce (we used caramel apple dip)

4 ounces cream cheese (I left this at home so we did without and it was fine. It would be thicker if you used it)

Add everything in a bowl and mix until stiff peaks form. Serve with apple slices.

All Ages

Baking and Decorating: Today in baking and decorating with made lemon poppy seed scones for the makers market.

Recipe:

Ingredients

Scones

4 cups flour

5 tablespoons sugar

4 tablespoons poppy seeds

2 tablespoons baking powder

1/2 teaspoon salt

zest of one lemon

10 tablespoons butter

2 eggs

1/13 cup soured milk

*to sour milk add 2 teaspoons white vinegar 1/13 cup milk and allow to sit for 15 minutes.

Lemon Glaze

3 1/2 cups powdered sugar

1/2 cup lemon juice

2 teaspoons butter

Instructions

1. Place rack in the center of the oven and preheat to 400F.
2. Prepare a baking sheet with parchment paper.
3. In a large bowl, whisk together the flour, sugar, poppy seeds, baking powder, salt, and lemon zest.
4. Cut butter into smaller pieces and with a pastry cutter, cut butter into the flour mixture until it resembles coarse meal.
5. In a small mixing bowl, whisk together the egg and soured milk.
6. Pour the milk mixture into the dry ingredients and stir until just combined. Then fold and knead together 8 to 10 times.
7. Dust the counter and turn out the dough.
8. Divide the dough into quarters and pat each into a circle (about 5 inches diameter.)
9. Cut the dough into 6 equal wedges.
10. Transfer whole disk onto prepared pan.
11. Bake for 20-25 minutes or until tops are lightly golden brown and firm.
12. Transfer to a wire rack to cool for 10 minutes.
13. Prepare the glaze.
 1. In medium microwavable bowl, whisk together the powdered sugar, lemon juice, and butter.
 2. Microwave for 45 seconds.
 3. Whisk again to mix well and allow to cool for a few minutes.
14. Drizzle glaze over scones and serve.

4th - 6th / 7th- 12th 

In Equine Explorers, students created charming horse hindquarters ornaments for the Makers Market! Each ornament was personalized with Christmas colors, yarn tails, beads, and bows as desired. The students did an amazing job, and we hope you'll come see their creations and shop at the Makers Market!

Next week will be our final horse anatomy review, using a Jeopardy-style game to test knowledge of the bones and parts of the horse. I've added the worksheets in the Google Doc linked [here](#) for students to review ahead of time. After this, we'll move on to the class's next focus: stable care, as chosen by the students.

All Ages

Our focus this week was First Aid across all age groups.

1st–3rd graders learned how to care for cuts and scrapes, discussed cleanliness and safety, and each built a mini first aid kit to take home.

4th–6th graders watched a video about real-life first aid scenarios, talked about how to respond in emergencies, and also created mini first aid kits for practical use.

7th–12th graders had a special guest speaker—Silvia, a former medic in the U.S. Army—who demonstrated life-saving techniques and discussed how to stay calm and act quickly in emergency situations. Students got to see real examples of first aid tools and procedures in action.

1st - 3rd / Amber Cox

Today, your students learned how a filtration system worked.

We talked about how its best to find a moving water source for drinking water instead of stagnant water. They put together a filter system using 3 major materials and then tested out how well it worked.

4th-12th / Silvia Duthie

Today, we made Ranger Beads, a tool used in land navigation to keep track of your steps so you know how far you've walked. They completed this craft so fast! We used the rest of the time to play football in the freezing cold (as requested by the students).

All Ages

Students got to learn and practice several basic patrol formations for how to move tactically outside in a group. This is the first tactical movement class of others to come in the spring as they learn for their air soft battle they will eventually do in someone's backyard as a field trip before the end of the year is out. They learned squad file, column and wedge, along with the hand signals for each, since while in movement, silence is essential. They also learned how to do a short stop or a longer stop at a rally point. Then they learned how to cross a dangerous road using either bumping or bounding methods. They took turns being in different positions, such as squad leader and team leaders. Battles eventually ensued with whatever snow was left on the ground.

All Ages

1st - 3rd

This week in ASL, we kicked things off by reintroducing ourselves and practicing fingerspelling our names. The kids did a great job remembering their letters! After that, we started learning new signs for weather and temperatures, like sunny, cloudy, rainy, hot, and cold. They also colored a fun worksheet to help them connect each sign with its meaning.

We introduced our new Bible verse, Genesis 1:1, and the class is encouraged to keep practicing both the verse and the weather signs at home.

Homework was sent home as well—a small packet where students look at words spelled out in ASL and write down the matching English letters. This week's theme is food. Thank you for helping your child practice!

4th - 12th

This week in ASL, our class started by introducing ourselves and practicing fingerspelling our names to refresh the ASL alphabet. After that, we moved into a new lesson focused on signing our everyday routines. Students learned signs such as wake up, eat breakfast, brush your teeth, wash your face, pack lunch, and leave for school. They picked these up quickly and were able to put the signs together in smooth sequences.

Once the routine signs were mastered, we spent time working on our class song. The students chose "Lemonade" by Forrest Frank, and they are already doing an excellent job learning the signs and rhythm. I encourage them to keep practicing at home. They can look up the song in ASL on YouTube—search "Lemonade ASL Hayden"—and use that video to review and practice throughout the week.

No written homework was sent home this time, but students are encouraged to continue practicing both the routine signs and the song so we can keep building on what they learned in class.

All Ages

We had such a fun day in music class! We did an activity about a chestnut tree that helped us continue working on audiation (singing in our head). Audiation is an important piece of the puzzle for all musicians, and the kids are doing a wonderful job with this skill! We also read a book about naughty squirrels and will learn a game to go along with the story next week!

All Ages

On both Monday and Tuesday, we read through John 1:1-4. We reviewed and delved a little deeper into how amazing it is that the “word” was in the beginning and what John was saying when he said the “word” — meaning Jesus and the Bible — and how they existed before the beginning and were already there at the beginning!!

This week, we played and learned more about volleyball. We learned how to hit the ball correctly. “Bump, set, and spike!”
