Human trafficking is a crime that affects more than 40 million people worldwide.

When a child is rescued from human trafficking, they need a safe place to call home. But there are a lack of safe places that can meet their recovery needs. They often end up in overcrowded government housing, on the street, or worse.

That's why Ally Global Foundation works to prevent human trafficking and support survivors through safe housing, education and aftercare.

Effective care for survivors requires years of love and support.

Many children arrive in our homes around age 14 and will stay for 8-10 years. And we're committed to walking beside them on their healing journey for however long it takes.

Our long-term recovery programs have already helped hundreds of children rescued from human trafficking experience safety and freedom.

Our local partners in Nepal, Laos, Cambodia and Canada understand the unique culture, context and language of each country and are experts in their field.




ABOUT ALLY

Our Approach

Safe Housing

Our safe homes provide a secure place for women and children to work through past trauma, build meaningful relationships with others and start to dream for their future. Homes are staffed by kind and understanding leaders, many of whom share similar backgrounds to the children in the home. Safe homes function like a family, creating relational trust, safety and responsibility between the children of varied ages in the home.





Reintegration

We help survivors build healthy, independent futures through job training, post-secondary scholarships and transitional housing support. Our local partners encourage young adults to dream, and connect them to the opportunities they need to build independent lives. After graduating from university or job training, staff help individuals transition from the safe home when they feel ready.

Prevention

Our prevention programs are informed by survivors. Our local partners work to research and identify areas of the country with a higher-risk of exploitation or trafficking. We provide children in vulnerable communities with the textbooks, supplies and uniforms needed to attend public rural schools. With the support of local leadership, our prevention team shares anti-trafficking presentations to educate students, teachers and the wider community about the dangers of human trafficking.

Covid-19 Prevention Obstacles

Covid-19 presented significant obstacles to our local partners' prevention and outreach programming. Government restrictions and lockdown orders made it near impossible for our teams to reach rural communities, particularly in Nepal and Cambodia.

RAJENDRA'S STORY 💷

Rajendra* came to the safe home of our local partner in Nepal at a young age. He had a speech impediment that was prominent when he was nervous and—because he came from a rural village—his dialect of Nepali was different from the one used in the capital city. This made school challenging for him, as the other children would tease him, making him even more nervous to speak.

In the safe home he experienced love from the leaders, and was able to make friends with boys his own age for the first time. The older boys helped him with school and he developed a love for reading. Soon, he was excelling in his classes.

As Rajendra worked through his final year of high school, he saw that the school was short on teachers, so he began to help teach some of the younger boys. Being able to share his education with others gave him joy and purpose, and it made him proud to see the younger boys improve in their schooling.

In 2020, Rajendra wrote the entrance exam for one of the top engineering universities in Nepal. Out of the 5,000 people who wrote the exam, he received the 5th highest mark. He told us that this was the biggest achievement of his life! Today, he is adjusting to life outside of the safe home as he studies engineering and shares an apartment with his best friend. Rajendra dreams of using his education to make his country a better place.

BEA'S STORY DE

Bea* is a safe home manager at our local partner in Laos. She lives in one of the safe homes and serves as a leader to 10 girls alongside their recovery journey:

Welcoming and supporting new girls as they settle into the safe home is the most challenging part of her job, Bea says, but also her favourite. She loves to help the girls however they need.

Whether it was dance, singing or sports, Bea loved witnessing all of the competitions the girls participated in! Some of her favourite memories of 2020 included watching the girls have fun and get excited about each and every competition.

As a newer staff member (only one year into her role), Bea said the hardest part of 2020 was "all of the new responsibilities I had to learn! Although my team was very good at helping me." In the last year, Bea said she's learned to have more patience and think more before speaking. We're thankful for Bea's work!

The new minibus allows for group transportation of up to 55 children from the safe homes to school, vocational training and recreational activities throughout the city. Previously, our local partner had relied on a 15-seater van to transport 34 children.

Two years ago, our local partner in Cambodia received a young girl to the safe home. She had been living with her older sister (who worked in prostitution) and was struggling to survive. Her adjustment to the safe home wasn't easy. She had many behavioural challenges, but despite her rough transition, our local leaders saw her open heart to change. Two years later, she's one of the best students in her private school. She's excelling in science and hopes to enter a national mathematics competition soon. Our local partner believes, "when children are given a peaceful home, they can thrive. If we remain committed to the success of our students, we believe they can change Cambodia!"

Covid-19 Relief



Laos

\$13,415 in relief funds

- → Distributed 2,800kg of rice to 233 families
- → 2,200 people impacted by the "Breath of Life" initiative —
- Our local safe home partner in Laos sewed fabric reusable masks to distribute to their community as an act of service and love. In August 2020 they distributed over 2,200 masks, including 200 to a community living at a nearby dump. After distributing masks in another village, our local team was able to give a presentation on human trafficking prevention and awareness.

\$42,100 in relief funds


- Emergency medical preparation for all safe homes
- → 12,670kg (27,932lbs) of emergency food supply distributed to the community during extreme lockdowns
- → School classrooms upgraded to meet Covid-19 requirements (plexiglass added to desks and sanitization stations placed throughout the property) ○



In October, 2020 our prevention team in
Nepal travelled to a rural village that was
affected by a landslide. Our local staff (and
older boys from our safe homes) distributed
essential food supplies to over 50 families
in the region. The trip also allowed our team
to establish new relationships that could
open doors to future anti-trafficking work
in the village.





Move for Freedom



On August 15th, 2020 we held our first annual Move for Freedom fundraising event. With Covid-19 restrictions preventing any typical in-person events, our team put together this participate-wherever-you-live fundraiser in just 10 weeks. Participants chose an activity they love (like hiking, biking or yoga), created a team and set a fundraising goal. On the event day, teams participated from wherever they live to help survivors find healing. The event was a huge success and participants showed up in a big way, exceeding our initial goal of \$250,000 to raise a total of \$309,449.








The Twelve Thousand

The Film

Covid-19 posed multiple challenges for our intended use of film in 2020. We were forced to cancel all of our in-person screenings and our local partners were unable to run their usual prevention programs—which would normally reach thousands of people in rural communities. Despite disappointments, we were able to celebrate the film winning multiple awards as well as its official online launch for worldwide streaming.


The Twelve Thousand

The Building Project



Our Nepal capital project is a campaign to raise \$5 million to buy land and build new safe home facilities. 
In 2020, **2,330** of you raised **\$1,872,548!**

In April we had a \$20K match campaign with a goal of raising \$40K, but instead you raised \$78,688!







Ally Global Foundation — Annual Report 2020





Last March, as the world was shutting down due to Covid-19, I boarded the last flight out of Kathmandu, Nepal.

Ally was just six months old as a charity and we had made significant commitments to our local partners and the children in their care. As I quarantined back home in Vancouver I entered a stage of depression and real fear. I wondered how we would be able to meet the needs we'd committed to amidst all the uncertainty that was ahead—both for you, our donors, and for our local partners in Laos, Cambodia and Nepal. We had been experiencing amazing engagement with The Twelve Thousand campaign and then suddenly had to cancel over 40 events. But despite these setbacks and unknowns, we saw our team and our donors rally together and adapt in order to make sure every need was met.

Today, I am overwhelmed by how you showed up—how, together, we were able to meet every operational need we had committed to. Beyond that, we were able to increase our number of safe homes, meaning we could care for more children. We also expanded our prevention work. We even were able to begin partnerships with organizations right here in Canada who are providing services to survivors in our own community. This was all made possible because of your generosity and commitment to contribute to a vision bigger than any one of us could achieve individually.

At the beginning of 2021 I spoke with a young woman on our team who is leading some of the work in Nepal. She said, "Randy, last year when everything changed, when the lockdowns started, we were afraid. We had no idea if we were going to be able to provide all that the children in our care needed. All of our costs were just barely being met and we knew of more children that needed help. I was so nervous." She then teared up and went on to say, "But we did, we

met every need. We exceeded what we thought would have been possible even in a year without challenges. Thank you to every person who believed in this mission. We are so grateful."

I thrive on looking forward, planning and casting vision for the things that need to be executed to move the needle. While I'm excited about all of what is ahead, this report is a reminder to reflect on and celebrate all that you've helped accomplish this past year. You have given hope to our local partners and helped care for hundreds of children walking through their recovery journey. I hope you are encouraged by the stories shared and the impact you've made over this past year. They are what get me excited each day, and I am so thankful we are on this mission together.
