SESSION'S PRIORITIES

IN 2023

Dear GPC Members and Friends -

A recent article said that the pandemic taught us to be lonely. We spent more time alone, or with fewer people. We ate alone. Loneliness became our default state, and we haven't gotten out of it yet.

This year, the session is hoping to change that. One of the priorities the session set for the church is providing occasions for people to connect. Dinners, lunches, tacos, ice cream—what would you like to see?

Our Lent book this year, Meeting Jesus at the Table, speaks about the power of eating with other people. Authors Cynthia M. Campbell and Christine Coy Fohr say, "Just as the Lord's Table stands at the center of Christian worship, so gathering with others to share a meal is at the heart of the human experience. Eating food sustains our bodies. Eating with others creates community and sustains our spirits. Feasting and the preparation and sharing of special foods is part of every religious tradition and most cultures as well."

We want to build that more fully into church life.

During Lent, fitting the theme of the book, we'll have some pop-up gatherings around a table to pray together and talk about the book. We want to have them in different areas, where people live.

So, the priorities for this year are:

- Building use, building on your ideas from last year. The Building Use Group is working on this.
- Hands-on mission projects following our checks with our hands and feet.
- Ways for people to connect.

What comes to mind when you think about these things? See you around the table!

The taste of communion and the touch of ashes lead us into the holy season of Lent, where we follow Jesus toward Jerusalem. As our forty days of Lent mirror Jesus' forty days in the desert, we look at how faithfully we follow Jesus . . . or don't.

Our **Lent book** is **Meeting Jesus at the Table**, by Cynthia M. Campbell and Christine Coy Fohr. The book explores all the times that people encountered Jesus at tables. To match the theme, we have worship and conversation together during Lent at different tables, in different locations. Watch for details.

The authors tell us: "In the last days of Jesus' life, he sat at a table sharing the Passover meal with his closest friends and connecting the ancient story of God's liberating power with himself. After the resurrection, Jesus' disciples began to gather regularly to break bread in his memory and to experience him in their midst. We do the same thing today. But the upper room was not the only time Jesus was at table or told stories about tables. In this study, we invite you to consider some of these table stories and to reflect on them as we come to the Lord's Table together in this Lenten season."

For worship and Sunday School, the **Lent curriculum** will be "Love God, Neighbor, Enemy," with our worship texts based on the same scriptures the children and youth use, so that we can have cross-church, mixed-generation conversations about what happens at church.

GREEN TRAVEL IS PART OF WISE STEWARDSHIP

Our Triune Lord created everything. Creation care involves applying the biblical principal of stewardship to everything God created, from our blue-green planet to all sentient beings. Part of wise stewardship is being an eco-conscious and respectful traveler. Whether you are visiting family, on a business trip, or learning about new people and customs in a different part of the world, consider doing so in a manner that embodies thoughtful stewardship.

Try to use transportation that adds the least greenhouse gas emissions to our atmosphere. **If you are traveling 200 miles or less, look for an alternative to flying.** On a 200-mile trip, a flight would emit around 109 pounds of CO₂ per person, a train 26 pounds, a charter bus 19 pounds. A solo driver in a gas car would emit 120 pounds of CO₂—the most polluting option! Each additional passenger reduces the emission cost per person, so four people in a car comes close to train emissions. (*terrapass.com*)

Locally, at home and wherever you visit, walking or unaided biking and scootering are best. Depending on how the electricity is created, electronic contraptions (bike, scooter, car) may add little CO₂. Mass transportation, such as buses, light rail, and trains, may add less. Smaller, hybrid, and electric cars are all better choices if you decide to use or rent a car.

Whatever your choice of transport, consider using a carbon offset program to compensate for the greenhouse emissions your travel will add to our atmosphere. Vendors may offer this when you buy tickets.

May your thoughtful stewardship enhance your transportation experiences!

UPDATE FROM THE BUILDINGS & GROUNDS COMMITTEE

RECENT REPAIRS

Making GPC a welcome gathering place is a high priority so that God can use it as a beacon to the community and a tool for Christ's mission. The GPC buildings currently support many partners, including Gaithersburg Presbyterian Preschool and Kindergarten (GPP&K), Cub Scout Pack 64, Mizo Presbyterian Church, and the Montgomery Philharmonic.

To maintain the church buildings, several repair activities were recently completed. Specifically, the roof over the Sanctuary was extended out over the walls and new gutters were installed to direct rain water away from the building. New HVAC units were installed in the Sanctuary and the portions of roof damaged by carpenter ants have been replaced. This new roof is visible over the south entrance and will be painted when warmer weather arrives.

EMERGENCY PREPAREDNESS PLANNING

In an abundance of caution, GPC is reviewing its preparedness to respond to security threats and other emergencies. The Gaithersburg Police Department completed a security assessment of GPC last October and conducted active assailant training for GPC staff in December. In general, the security assessment was positive concerning controls and procedures in place. One recommendation was to periodically practice evacuations. GPC last performed an evacuation in September 2012 and was able to evacuate the Sanctuary in under 5 minutes.


