

## FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

## Q: What do you do with llamas?

**A:** Their fiber can be made into yarn, they can be therapy animals and visit schools, libraries, etc., and their manure makes a wonderful garden soil amendment. Llamas make good guardians for alpaca, sheep and goats, they are great hiking companions who will gladly carry your stuff, with training they can pull a cart.

### Q: Do llamas spit?

**A:** Yes. It is usually directed at each other, not humans, and is about food, mating, or herd hierarchy. It is a last resort for them as it tastes terrible.

#### O: What do llamas eat?

A: Grass, hay, grain formulated for llamas, a mineral supplement.

#### O: Where are llamas from?

A: South America. Native to the Andes, they also live in the USA.

#### Q: Can you ride llamas?

A: No. Llamas are bred to be used as pack animals.
