Hazelglenn Farm

Project Description: Hazelglenn Farm, owned by the Schultz family for more than 50 years, is located within the Ashippun River watershed of the Rock River Basin, with a portion of the Ashippun River (an "Aquatic Area of Local Significance" and "Rare Species Habitat" as classified by the DNR) running adjacent to the property. Approximately 17 acres of the propertied property are within Waukesha County's Primary Environmental Corridor, part of the Ashippun River Greenway. The farm also includes a well-preserved historic farmhouse and barn.

During his time with Tall Pines Conservancy, Truman Schultz wore many hats – member of the Board of Directors and Conservation Committee, past President, and the Advisory Board. For his many years of dedication to and support of farmland conservation, he was awarded the Guy Kieckhefer Pioneer Award in 2024.

Why: Truman and Barbara Schultz and their family preserved their farm and donated their development rights for the following reasons:

- **1.)** Concern about the continued loss of prime agricultural land resulting from rising development pressure.
- **2.)** Recognition that ongoing careful stewardship of their land will support local water qualities initiatives in Lake Country.
- **3.**) To help preserve the historic buildings preserved for future generations.
