

The **Friends4Cause** foundation organized a golf tournament in Piedmont, Quebec to fundraise for three Canadian charities—and Ally was honoured to be one of their charitable recipients! With the help of 100 attendees and over a dozen volunteers, they raised \$10,000 for Ally.

How did you first become aware of Ally?

I first became aware of Ally through a discussion with friends. My wife and I were looking to partner financially with an organization and when we learned about Ally's mission we jumped on board. I am the father of two daughters who have been born into a loving, safe environment and I could not sit on the sidelines knowing these atrocities were happening around the world.

What made you decide to commit to supporting Ally as a business?

Our business provides services to nonprofit organizations through the implementation of technology. We were looking to partner with a local nonprofit and get our team engaged in a philanthropic way. Based on my personal experience with Ally, choosing to support through our business was a logical choice that just made sense.

We've had a lot of uptake from our team over the past year of the partnership. Dreams Coming True

A LETTER FROM OUR EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

Since the day Ally Global Foundation was founded, it has been our mission to become an ally to our local partners in Nepal, Laos and Cambodia-partners who show up every day to serve the needs of the many survivors in their care. (And through your donations and support, you've adopted this mission as well.)

Last year was not without difficulties, heartbreak and suffering—but above the struggle, there was an extraordinary amount of hope and redemption—and that's what you'll find reflected in this report.

As I reflected on this past year—scrolling through hundreds of photos, re-reading hastily-written iPhone notes of inspirational stories and detailed WhatsApp messages from our local partners overseas—I saw dreams coming true.

At the beginning of 2021, I travelled to Nepal to visit with our local partner team shortly after another strict Covid-19 lockdown had lifted across the country. It was very encouraging to spend time with our team in Nepal and see the progress that had been made since my previous trip in early 2020. A new safe home was opened to meet the intensive needs of extreme trauma victims, allowing our team to care for these individuals with even greater precision and attention. In years past, carefully rationing food and protein in the safe homes—due to lack of funding—was a frequent reality. But as I walked through the homes, I was grateful to see a 3-5 month supply of food in storage: our team was prepared for future lockdowns and able to provide nutrition for the surrounding communities when needed. Dreams realized.

On International Women's Day, our team posted this quote on social media: "Little girls with dreams become women with vision." Last year, I heard many of the young women in our safe homes share their visions. Some shared visions of furthering their education in nursing, architecture, social work and teaching. Others put courageous vision into action, setting up prevention outposts in the rural communities where they were originally trafficked. One young woman launched a school to educate future generations and work toward shifting her culture's value of girls. And across all of our local partners, I saw the leaders delve deeper into their vision of providing dignity for every individual in their care: by encouraging children to dream and doing whatever is needed to resource those dreams!

The greatest privilege of my life is working with our team of local partners and international leaders.

These dedicated individuals make sacrifices every day to prevent human trafficking and care for survivors. To push this mission forward, they give it all they have. For me, it's a dream to be doing this work alongside leaders that I both admire and learn from continually.

Generous and continued support from our donors allowed us to provide care for even more children in 2021. In Cambodia, we were able to launch a new safe home. In Nepal, we saw 55 young adults reintegrated and welcomed 31 new children into care. In Canada, we completed an in-depth research project (in collaboration with 27 experts) which will eventually guide the creation of educational resources to prevent the sex trafficking of minors within our own country. (As this project progresses, we look forward to sharing how you can be involved.)

Recently, the expansion of our staff team in Vancouver created a pressing need for a larger office space. A generous group of individuals and companies came together to finance, renovate and furnish a new office—which is set to open sometime in the Spring of 2022. Another dream realized.

Last year, we continued to fundraise toward our goal of buying land in Nepal to build new safe homes and education facilities. After years of dreaming and searching and thousands of hours of due diligence (which included viewing over 160 pieces of property), we found the property! Alongside our team in Nepal, we carefully considered the purchase—envisioning a stable home for the next 50+ years of work. At the end of 2021, we placed the first deposit on the land, and the purchase is set to complete in Spring 2022. Another dream realized.

For me, the most remarkable part of the land fundraising process has been witnessing the

investment of the leaders and children in Nepal. Without prompting, many made donations from their salaries and allowances, collectively contributing \$4,417 toward the land purchase. Some of our team members gave multiple months of their salary. (That's worth re-reading.) Their commitment to this project—in time, energy and finances brings me to tears every time I think about it.

Our impact in 2021 was possible because of people like you: people who've committed to preventing human trafficking and helping survivors find healing.

I'm grateful to have you as part of this mission. If space allowed, I could share so much more about the many dreams in progress.

Thank you for believing in this work, committing to long-term care and enabling new dreams to be realized. I am full of anticipation for what is ahead.



Canadian Work

As a Vancouver-based charity, we're committed to <u>working</u> <u>alongside</u> and supporting fellow Canadian non-profits and agencies to prevent human trafficking, raise awareness and provide aftercare for survivors locally. We also aim to promote a <u>culture of generosity</u> among our team by offering a monthly donation matching allowance for any staff who give to other registered Canadian charities.



LOCAL SUPPORT ······

EDUCATION & AWARENESS

We partner with existing safe homes in British Columbia to provide both immediate and long-term recovery for women and children rescued from human trafficking and abuse in Canada.

This past year, we were able to support the rental costs for a local safe home in Vancouver that served six women in full-time care. We also helped cover the counselling and care costs for 40 women through local programs that provide services for survivors of human trafficking in Vancouver. We are committed to developing resources that combat and prevent the human trafficking of minors in Canada. In 2021, we completed an initial assessment for how we can better serve our country with prevention and education resources against the sex trafficking of minors. The insights collected from this research will guide the creation of educational resources and campaigns over the next several years.

Through conducting interviews with 27 experts in the Canadian anti-trafficking space, several high-level themes emerged. Outlined to the right are some of these findings. \rightarrow


Perceived obstacles in the prevention of sex trafficking of minors in Canada:

- → Lack of education and awareness about sex trafficking
- → Lack of education about healthy relationships
- → Systemic racism
- \rightarrow Unregulated technology
- \rightarrow Lack of culturally appropriate resources
- → Parents unaware of how to navigate technology and the digital age with their children
- → Lack of collaboration between organizations

Recommended solutions for prevention of sex trafficking of minors in Canada:

- → Education within school systems on sex trafficking and healthy relationships that is age appropriate and consistent
- → Education about systemic racism within government, police force and health care
- → Providing education to parents around social media use, technology, boundaries and healthy relationships
- → Empowerment for youth around setting boundaries, consent, assertiveness and self-esteem
- \rightarrow Creating culturally and age appropriate resources
- \rightarrow Collaborative work amongst organizations

We believe collaboration with national leaders (who understand the language and cultural context in each country) is vital to <u>ethical development work</u>.

Our local partners are experts in their fields and we wouldn't be able to do this work without them.

More than a Partnership

My family has been working in Nepal since 2000, in partnership with a locally led NGO. As Ally's partners in Nepal you have been partnering with us bringing financial resources and helping us to alleviate the financial burden we used to have. Since Ally started its partnership with us, many of our programs have improved and grown—such as our safe homes, agriculture project, safe school and scholarship prevention programs.

Further than providing financial resources for our operations, the Ally team works alongside our teams relationally. Some of the major efforts and consultancy has been raising funds and project managing the purchase process for new land to move our projects towards self sustainability. We are excited to move forward with the land purchase in 2022 and move into the building phase. It has been a dream of our many staff for decades to have our own property to provide further restoration for children for decades to come. Our lives will be much easier without the burden of monthly rent expenses, and the girls and boys sheltered with us will have a place to call their own "home".

Besides finances, Ally has been supportive in areas such as counseling and, above all, friendship and companionship, supporting us in all possible ways.



• Land Search

We began the search for a piece of property that could both house all operations as well as enable the addition of food security through a large agriculture project. We hope to finalize options and begin fundraising by Q3 in 2022.



NEPAL LAOS • Land Purchase • Food Security Social Ventures

We reviewed more than 160 pieces of potential land to purchase for the building of our future safe homes and school. Our team completed due diligence on many properties and was able to put a deposit on a piece of property. We hope to close on this property in early 2022.


Prevention Programs

*Prevention reach in 2021 was limited due to regional Covid-19 lockdowns.

Although it's difficult to comprehend, poverty and a lack of education opens up many young girls and boys to the risk of exploitation.

Traffickers tend to target children from rural communities by promising them education or work opportunities in the city. For this reason, awareness presentations about the warning signs and brutal realities of human trafficking are vital to prevention.



Our local partners take teams into rural areas where the risk of exploitation is higher. They show presentations and share stories to help educate parents and children about the dangers and signs of trafficking.

One of our team members in **Laos** shares about a prevention outreach they did in March, reaching 252 people across two cities:

"After the presentation, one boy shared a story with us about someone he knew."

"This person he knew, another boy about 25 years old, had been asked by a friend to go work in Thailand. Thankfully, the boy's cousin found out about it and realized that this was not a safe situation because there were no legal documents, and the boy did not go to Thailand. When people do not know what human trafficking is and how it happens, stories like this can have a very different ending."

SCHOLARSHIPS ······

One of the best ways to prevent trafficking is to make sure children have access to education. Our team helps families who can't afford to send their children to school by supplying them with uniforms, textbooks, supplies and tuition.

Though Covid-19 continued to present obstacles to our local partners' ability to reach rural communities, this fall they were finally able to resume prevention programming. One of our team members in **Nepal** shares about their first prevention trip after pandemic restrictions had lifted:

"On this trip we were able to give scholarships to 68 new students and made 14 home visits." "All of the students we visited were financially poor. Some did not have parents to care for them, and were being taken care of by someone else. Some families lived in one small room, and struggled just to meet basic needs. Some were in situations of abuse and violence, or had fathers who would spend money on alcohol rather than sending their children to school. Some students had no place to stay at all, and were living in a slum area. When these children's tuition can't be paid, they are forced to leave school. We are so happy to be able to provide them with scholarships. But more than that, we are glad to listen to their stories and talk with them. They were touching moments for us as we could feel their pain. We could tell that they were eager to study and work hard. We are extremely happy to be able to give them a new hope."

COVID-19 RELIEF / FOOD SECURITY ······

In addition to providing school tuition and educating families on the dangers of trafficking, prevention work can involve supporting families in the community with basic needs. This is especially true for our local partner in **Cambodia**, where public education is more readily available, meaning their prevention work focuses on building relationships through food security and presentations.

In October we helped five poor families in the village. One family had previously owned a business, but Covid-19 had caused them to lose everything. We were able to bring them hope again and show them that they are not alone. It's incredible to see smiles on the faces of those who have lost many things, and how one package of food can be much more than just food on the table but also light and hope. Because of your support we are able to bring this light and hope to families. Thank you."

We are grateful to have put together over 280 relief packages for people in need! Some of our safe home leaders and children from the safe homes were able to build these packages with food or medical materials like masks, sanitizers, medicine, etc. We tried to distribute as many packages as possible in person but in the places where we couldn't, we passed the packages to the municipalities so they could distribute them."

NEW PREVENTION VEHICLES ······

In order to reach rural communities with prevention programming, our local partners often have to travel on long, difficult roads with poor infrastructure. To make these trips successful, they require sturdy, reliable transportation. Thanks to your generosity, our local partners were able to purchase **five new prevention vehicles** this year (two trucks and three motorcycles). These new vehicles are helping our team establish new relationships with leaders in vulnerable regions, and deliver food and care packages to communities in need. "We are so happy and thankful to receive a new pickup truck to better serve our community here in Cambodia. This new car is making our work in the villages much easier, because the roads are difficult. We are now saving time and able to help more families in need."

Agriculture Programs

NEPAL ·····

Our local partner in Nepal has dreams of a sustainable food supply for the entire project, and for years they have been developing their farm to make this a reality. In 2021, exciting steps were taken toward this goal. The first chicken coop was completed and more than 400 chicks now call it home. There are three functional greenhouses on the property, as well as a brick oven.

As the farm continues to grow it will become a source of food for the safe homes as well as providing employment for young adults who are ready to leave the homes and make a life for themselves.

"It is very encouraging to see this sustainability project take flight because this will enable food security for all our safe homes and provide a source of income in the long term."

This past Summer, our local partner was able to process and freeze 350 chickens (about 2.5kg each!) from the farm, for distribution among the safe homes back in Kathmandu. Chickens were also shared with neighbours and community members in need. Our team is very proud of their success and is looking forward to continuing their work at the farm!

LAOS ------

Our local partner in Laos shares an update on their agriculture project and the impact it's making:

"Our farm is currently in the process of building four greenhouses. This is an exciting project for many reasons. First off, having an area to grow high-quality vegetables all year-round will allow the farm to produce more vegetables. These vegetables will then be provided to the girls in the homes and to the social venture coffee shop, and any leftovers will be sold for profit.

Secondly, with the additional work being created, more workers are needed to not only build the greenhouses but also to maintain them afterward. This has allowed for more safe-work opportunities for those in the local community.

Thirdly, as the farm continues to build relationships within the community it will provide more opportunities for the team to teach about human trafficking prevention and awareness.

Finally, it will allow the opportunity to train students through the future vocational training school, allowing for valuable skills to be learned."



Our safe homes provide a loving environment for children to work through their trauma and build meaningful relationships with others.

Many of the leaders in the homes share similar backgrounds to the children, so they are uniquely equipped to support other survivors in their healing journey. The homes operate like a family in the way that they create relational trust and responsibility. Each child is given an older "sibling" who looks out for them, and a younger "sibling" that they help care for.

JUNU'S* STORY

For Junu, life at home was difficult. Growing up, she was dependent on her mother who moved frequently between relationships with different men. After realizing that her mother's newest partner was not safe to be around, Junu ran away and returned to her mother's previous partner. He was unable to care for Junu, but fortunately he was a kind man who did not want to see Junu fall into the hands of traffickers and be forced into abuse and exploitation like her sister had been.

After a childhood of domestic instability, Junu was introduced to our local partner in Cambodia, who took her into their care.

When Junu arrived at the safe home her academic performance was poor and she struggled to pay attention in class, but with the encouragement of the home leaders and the help of her new sisters, she became one of the top students in her class. Now her favourite subject is math and she is planning to attend university in a few years time.

After everything Junu has been through, her home leaders say she "should" be rebellious.

Instead, she has a beautiful heart. She's funny and loves to make others laugh. She loves to cook creative dishes and has dreams of one day having her own farm.


When another girl at the safe home (who had just been rescued from human trafficking) was struggling with school, Junu made it her mission to help her succeed. On her first day of school, Junu advocated for her new friend at the school office, asking the staff to place the girls in the same class together. Every afternoon Junu helped her with her homework and encouraged the girl by telling her that "she will overcome, she can do it, she is not alone."

The kindness of her new family in the safe home started Junu on track toward a bright future.

One of our leaders in Cambodia shared the following with us about the environment they try to create for children in their homes—an environment that can bring hope and healing:

"Here in Cambodia we are a family, and family helps each other. Families are kind with each other, they encourage each other, they overcome together. Family heals. Family is safe. We believe that this is one of the best medicines that our home brings to them: a family. Kindness starts in a family. Thank you for becoming a part of ours."





ARJUN'S* ANIMALS ······

Arjun, one of the boys in our Nepal safe homes, is dreaming about becoming a veterinarian one day. Arjun says some of his high school subjects can be challenging, but he's trying his best to get good grades so he can be a veterinarian in the future. In the meantime, he's gaining hands-on experience caring for two turkeys that live on the safe home property:

"I've always loved taking care of animals, even as a kid. I enjoy watching Animal Planet, National Geographic and the Discovery Channel and I learn a lot from those shows! I take care of our two turkeys, giving them clean water and food twice a day. I've divided our back yard for them with a fence, so they have their own space. I've also covered the top of their fenced area with rope, so they don't fly outside to another house. The male turkey's name is Tom, but I haven't named the female yet. One of the most interesting things is that whenever we make a loud sound, Tom responds by making a loud sound too!"

Our safe home leaders tell us that Arjun's favourite part of the day is caring for the turkeys!

BIRTHDAYS ·····

"A simple birthday party can bring a big impact to a life who has suffered," shares one of our leaders in Cambodia.

Because of this, every new child who arrives to the safe homes in Cambodia has a BIG party for their first birthday in the homes!

The birthday child is invited to choose the party theme and the colours to make it special. The celebration includes balloons, candy, cake and gifts. The "brothers and sisters" in the home gives hugs and gifts, showing their love to the child.

One of the leaders told us, "We must celebrate their lives and let them know and believe how important they are. This is another way we can bring healing to them."

CHRISTMAS CELEBRATION IN NEPAL ······

On December 24th, our local partners in Nepal celebrated Christmas with all of the staff, children and some family members. The team decorated the school grounds and some of the boys even constructed a stage for the programming. On the night, the children performed dances, drama and singing and everyone enjoyed a delicious dinner of roasted pork and chicken. The children especially enjoyed the ice cream that was served after dinner. Presents were given to everyone in attendance and sent to those who were unable to be there. It was a beautiful celebration!

Last Spring, the older girls in our Cambodia safe homes got to experience a very exciting day. They were each given an allowance to buy new clothes and visited a beautiful store together.

One of our Cambodia leaders shared with us, "Maybe for many this feels simple, but for the girls it was a big experience to feel worthy... to feel that they are important: to us, to society and for the future of Cambodia. We want to thank you for letting us live this amazing experience with them. It was wonderful to see their happiness, and how each one of them was able to spend their money, and make choices. It was really amazing."


Education

A large component to helping survivors reintegrate successfully and thrive as adults is bridging the education gap.

After experiencing trauma or abuse, entering the public school system can be damaging to a child's self esteem. Our local partners operate safe schools with trauma-informed teachers who understand what the children have been through and can provide a safe and dignifying learning environment for the students.

They also provide specialized classes for youth starting school for the first time at an older age—a common circumstance for survivors of trafficking. In these classes, teachers meet the children where they're at and help them learn at whatever pace they need, in an environment that builds up their confidence.



NEW COMPUTERS ······ For online learning

In April 2021, Cambodia entered another lockdown to curb the spread of Covid-19. Schools across the country were closed, and our safe homes had to suddenly adjust to online Zoom classes for the children.

But there was another problem: the safe homes had only two computers to share amongst all of the children between grades 1–12. The leaders scrambled, sharing phones and any other devices that had a camera and microphone for the children to learn.

Within a few weeks, Ally was able to purchase 10 new laptops for the Cambodia safe homes! Now the homes have 12 laptops total, one dedicated to each grade.

One of our safe home leaders shared with us, "Now we can concentrate on only teaching the children—not fixing devices before classes—which is amazing!"

Our local partner in Nepal faced the same problem, but on a larger scale, as there are more children in care. Because of your generosity, we were able to purchase 50 laptops for the homes so that the children could continue their education online. These laptops will also be used in the safe school once restrictions loosen and classes resume in person.


ANKITA'S* STORY ······

Ankita was rescued from India at the age of 15. After her rescue, Ankita was repatriated to her home country of Nepal. She arrived at our local partner's safe home with her baby boy, born during her captivity.

Today, Ankita is happily married and her 12-year old son is thriving in his classes at school. She works as a sewing instructor, equipping younger women with the skills needed to create a future for themselves.

"The best part about living at the safe homes was the new family I found," says Ankita. "I really love my home leaders because they took care of me like a parent. I have complete trust and love for them as they have continuously supported me ever since I came with my son years ago."

"I am not a very book smart person but my home leaders gave me the opportunity to study and to build a practical skill in sewing and tailoring so I could be a successful adult. During my time in the home, the leaders would ask me to try new things and I loved it. This was the first time that I was given not only the opportunity to try new things, but the tools to be able to do them well."



Reintegration

Reintegration is an important part of the healing process for survivors of human trafficking, but it takes immense courage to step out independently into the world.

When individuals feel ready, our local partners help them transition from the safe homes. As they slowly gain independence, our team assists by subsidizing their rent for a few months and providing necessary items like bedsheets, a bed and basic supplies. The leaders have shared with us that even though these young adults are ready to be independent, their "goodbye" parties are always emotional for everyone.

FROM CHILD TO BRAVE LEADER ······

After ten years living in the care of our local partner in Cambodia, a young woman decided to remain at the safe home as a caregiver and worker. In the last decade, she's graduated from school, learned to speak English and now manages her own money.

One of the staff who watched this young woman's transformation shared:

After survivors have reintegrated, our local partners make it a priority to continue relationship with them. Due to the ongoing pandemic this year, our leaders were not able to move as freely and conduct these check-in visits as often as usual. However, as of this Summer, the work was able to start again safely in Nepal.

The reintegration team spent time visiting many homes and reported that it was "a great moment to spend time sharing, talking and listening to them." The heart behind these visits is to remind graduates that "they are not forgotten but still a part of our big family. We will be here whenever they need us."

Some of the graduates are continuing to study, and many are working full-time, or have gotten married and started families.

"We are happy to see the amazing woman she has become! She arrived as a child and is now a wonderful woman and a fighter against human trafficking."

As we look ahead, we're full of excitement and expectation for the lives you will help us impact in 2022—both the individuals currently in care at our safe homes, and the many new children we will welcome as our capacity increases.

In 2022, we will take big steps toward our 10-year vision of self-sustainability for our local partners in Nepal, Laos and Cambodia. We will complete the purchase of land in both Nepal and Laos (and continue searching for land in Cambodia) to build new safe homes and education facilities.

As land purchases are finalized, we will begin the design and construction phases for new buildings in Nepal and Cambodia and renovations in Laos. In each country, these projects will increase stability, eliminate rental costs and facilitate the restoration and education of children for generations to come.

We see the physical roots we're setting in Nepal, Laos and Cambodia as a tangible expression of our commitment to the longterm work required to create systemic change and impact future generations. Similarly, in Canada, our growing team will be moving into a new office space in Vancouver—with a focus on expanding our education and prevention work domestically.

To meet the needs we've established for 2022, we anticipate a financial target of **7.2 million** dollars. With ongoing support from our generous community, we're hopeful that 2022 will be an exceptional year.
