Certainly so my story begins in November of 1964 when I was born and even my birth is actually. Amazing and I'm very grateful that the lord spared my life because one of the things about my birth mother is that she actually had sepsis. She had gotten very sick and in March of 1 65 when I was five months old my mother passed away from lock jaw and lots of people don't know about locked Jaw. It's a form of tetanus but the tetanus has gotten so severe that the person is left. Like just stiff as a board and um, that's something that's very unique even for 1965 because there were ways of ah of resolving tetanus and of treating it. But um. That really tells you how foreign destitute my family was and that my mother did not seek medical. Its attention. So um, i.

Lord took her life at that point and I was five months old and I had 4 older siblings. My oldest sibling was 14 at the time and so we were left with a father who was um. An alcoholic he from stories that I've heard. He was very abusive and so the children were basically left on their own. Um for a short period of time and then that's when my adoptive parent too for. For the listeners of your podcast I will refer to them throughout this story as my mother and my father or my mom

and my dad because those are the people that I grew up knowing as my parents and. So they entered that picture about I believe it was two days after my mother's death and um, my father who knew my older siblings. He knew my 2 older siblings at the time. Because periodically they would go to the same church that my mom and dad were at and my father worked with the youth at the church. My mother served as the church secretary at the time and so when he found out that the Miller Children

have to say that I had no clue beyond before that time because they treated us all so much the same because the rest of the story is that they actually had. 2 children biologically their own um following my birth at in in 1 64 and then I had a sister that was born in 68 a brother that was born in 73 so you know we were all. Such a family unit and I never I never experienced a difference in how they treated me and how they treated their own children so that to me speaks a lot to to how they just knew this was. We're taking people into our family.

She was in a nursing home in Atlanta she had multiple sclerosis and she was given about six months to live at the time when she came to live with us. She could move her head and she could still lift her right arm to feed herself but she had no she had paralysis basically from the waist down and much on her left side. At the time so we we so lovingly called her aunt Gwen and so aunt gwen.
